RUSSIANS AGREE TO BRITISH REQUEST AND WILL SPARE LIVES OF SOLDIERS

LONDON, May 12.—Russian Bolshevik authorities have agreed to spare the lives of soldiers captured from General Denekine's army in Southern Russia, and those of other anti-Soviet troops who may in future be taken prisoner. A note to this effect was today received by British officials in answer to appeals sent to Moscow by this country during the past fortnight.

Suggestion is made in the Bolshevik note that the British Government negotiate with Bolshevik representatives, preferably those now in Copenhagen, regarding final disposition of men captured in the fighting against General Denekine, and also relative to resumption of trade relations between the two countries.

FASHIONS FOR CANADIANS

The type of hat said to be having the greatest sale for the coming summer is the one made of transparent material. This may be hair braid, maline, organdy, Georgette, or lace. So heavy, in fact, is the demand for transparent hats that it is difficult to secure hair braid in sufficient quantity to supply the demand.

The hat of all over lace may be a very handsome affair, indeed, and either black or white lace or a lace dyed to match the costume the lace is to accompany may be used. Dyed laces are used extensively this season both in the dress and millinery fields. Many women are quite adept at lace these days, and the woman who is fond of this sort of handwork may make herself a hat of Irish crochet or Fillet lace that will be the envy of all her friends.

The hat may be entirely of one of these hand-made laces, or a flat mat the proper size may be used for the top of the crown, the sides to be filled in with chiffon. Chiffon may be used to underline the brim, the top of which will, of course, be of lace.

Leighorn hats are again in rather high favor for the coming summer; but the tendency is to have a leighorn and silk combination rather than a hat entirely of the leighorn. The crown may be slit to let in bits of silk, or an entire silk crown may be used to top a drooping leighorn brim.

SEEDING NOT YET GENERAL WITH SEEDERS

SASKATOON, May 11.—Seeding has not become general in this district yet, recent rains and lack of warm weather putting the season three weeks behind normal. In old sections seeding has begun but it will be almost a week before the majority can start.

WILL BE GOOD FOR SYDNEY PLANTS

MONTREAL, May 12.—A million dollar fund for the propaganda of the "Canadian Manufacturers' Association was foreshadowed tonight at the annual dinner of the Montreal Branch Among the guests were Colonel W. Grant Morden; Sir James McKechnie, head of the Vickers firm of England, and many of the business leaders of the Province.

L. P. Howard, as President of the Dominion Manufacturers' Association said that they had approached the Government on the necessity for a scientific tariff board for Canada and stated that it would be considered with the support of 1,600 Labor Unions of Canada as well as the manufacturers and employers.

In a defence of great industrial mergers both here and in England, Colonel Morden said that both he and his colleagues were at present giving great attention to a plan that would be announced in due course, under which "we will give our employees not only an opportunity to participate in the success of the industry but also representation on our directorate."

Touching on the shipbuilding industry, Colonel Morden said the British Empire Steel Corporation was going to build ships, with the steel plants in Sydney and their wonderful facilities in having the raw material at hand, it was obvious that with ships, there would be a complete circle in industry which would make Canada quite independent.

Two transparent Hats for Mid-summer Wear

The sketch shown to-day illustrates two very smart transparent hats either of which may be made at home with very little difficulty. The upper one is of organdy, and may be in white or a color, according to preference. It is, of course, made over a wire frame, and is trimmed simply with a scarf of self fabric, decorated with embroidery done in cross stitch in contrasting color. The scarf ties at the back in a flaring bow. The lower part of the hat is of figured silk voile, and it is trimmed with black velvet ribbon drawn through jet rings and tied in a soft bow near the back. These hats are usually vastly becoming, and they are so light in weight that they are ideal for mid-summer wear.

WOMAN IS THE FOOD INSPECTOR

ST. JOHN, N. B., May 12.—Edmund Flewelling has been appointed food inspector by Board of Health and will enter her new duties today. These comprise the inspection of all res. restaurants, and hotels, candy, fruit, milk, ice cream, any other kind of food is inspected. The inspector will also be required to see that the food is properly carried out by the Mrs. Flewelling is the first woman in St. John to have been appointed to such an office.

Italian Cabinet Crisis Unsettled

ROME, May 15.—After a spent in almost continual cabinet crisis, King Victor Emmanuel, late tonight asked Signor Nomi, who was Minister of the Interior, to form a new cabinet. It was grave doubt whether he would be able to carry out King's request. A solution of the crisis was proving unusually difficult. The King conferred Orlando and Tittoni during the morning, later calling in former President Giolitti. His attempt to harmonize differences between Premier Nitti, and Signor Nomi, Catholic leader, failed.
