THE successor to the late American Consul in this port, Hon. D. J. Shirley and he is accompanied by his wife and son. He is a Chicagoan, and formerly was engaged in the handling of mining properties. As the successor of his greatly respected predecessor and as the representative of the great Republic he will meet with a cordial welcome from citizens.

THERE will be many who will learn with regret of the death of James Dorsey of this city which occurred on Saturday. He was 62 years of age and has been ill for about a month. He leaves a widow and a family of ten children, five sons and five daughters, besides a sister, Mrs. Patrick Kelly, of Cambridge, Mass. The sons are Dr. James K. Dorsey, of Wichita, Kansas; Patrick, engineer on the P. E. I. P.; Joseph, medical student at McGill, John in the City of New Brunswick; Francis at home. The daughters are: Mary E. wife of J. J. Johnson, of this city; Florence, with her brother in Kansas; May, wife of Arthur E. Hogan, Ellis teacher in Queen Square School, and Ethel at home. The funeral takes place this morning at 8.45 to St. Dunstan's Cathedral.

A RATHER interesting case in the Admiralty Court of this Province, tried before the Chief Justice (as occupied the Court for the past fortnight. The owners of the steamer Anella brought two actions against the schooner Diana, for \$1000, for damages claimed to have been effected by the collision of the steamer with the schooner, the other was for \$800 for towing the schooner into Souris Harbor. The owners of the schooner, claim \$4000 against the steamer each party thus trying to render the other responsible for the collision. The plaintiffs claim that the night was dark, that the schooner's lights were not burning, and that the steamer could not see her until it was too close to manoeuvre, also that the Diana, either did not have proper light, or else the position of the two ships, was such that the schooner should have exhibited a torch light, or blown a fog horn. If the steamer was not two points abaft the beam, she could not see the lights even if they were burning. The defendant claims that the bearing of the steamer towards the schooner was not two points abaft the beam, that they had the proper lights. The counsel for the company are RE Harris, K. C. of Halifax, and W. S. Siewar K. C. of Charlottetown; and for the schooner Edward S. Dodge of Boston, Mass, and Fred R. Taylor of St. John. Mr. Dodge is a specialist in marine law. The case was concluded Saturday afternoon and judgment reserved.
