HON MR. BLAIR ON THE WEST.

In the splendid anniversary number of the Financial News of London, dated 23rd January is an article entitled Twenty years of Canadian Railways, by Hon. A. G. Blair.

If completed as now proposed, it will have a continuous track laid from the St. Lawrence River (and possibly from more Eastern termini at the ports of Halifax and St. John) to the Pacific Ocean, a distance of 3,000 miles if from Quebec and 3,500 or 3,600 miles if measured from St. John or Halifax.

It would seem from this that Mr. Blair at the time of writing the article looked upon the St. Lawrence River as the probable terminus of the Grand Trunk Pacific, while the extension to Atlantic ports is implied to be "possible."

It will be of greater interest to know that Mr. Blair has an abounding confidence in the resources and prospects of our great Northwest and also in the rapid development of our railway systems.

"The new road, after reaching Winnipeg, will take a course to the north of the Canadian Northern, passing through what is in the main a fertile country and well adapted for mixed farming, cattle raising, and even wheat growing in certain areas.

"It is believed that the country between the Great Lakes and the Rockies, within the lives of persons already born, will have five or six through rail ways, which might, in the common parlance of today, be called transcontinental lines.

It will be observed that there is a marked difference in tone, to go no further, between Mr. Blair's article in the Financial News and his speech in Parliament at the time of his retirement from the cabinet on his refusal to endorse the Grand Trunk Pacific agreement.

FATAL ACCIDENT.

The following clipping from the Dawson Bulletin of Dec. 11th, tells of a fatal accident that befell Henry McCabe, a native of Halifax Co., N. S. and a brother to Layton McCabe of Alexandria, P. E. I.

was instantly killed Saturday afternoon, while working in a drift 70 feet under ground and 50 feet away from the shaft.

Mr. McCabe left his home in N. S. twenty-four years ago, and took up his residence in California, where he still owns a home and 320 acres of land.

Mr. McCabe assisted in building the C. P. R. bridge over the Fraser River in B. Columbia, and also assisted in the construction of the Madiera lumber flume, which floats lumber from the mills in the Sierra Nevada Mts. down to the town of Madiera, a distance of 50 miles.

In private life he was a most exemplary citizen; was noted for his sterling integrity, and among a large circle of friends was claimed as the very soul of honor.

GENTLEMEN.—After months of preparation for a general election the Government have decided that it is in the interests of their party that another session should be held, and the official statement or reason given for not appealing to the country at present is that certain modifications have been asked for by the Grand Trunk Railway Company to the contract entered into last session.

Although the pronounced policy of the Liberal party when in opposition was that all by-elections to fill vacancies in the House of Commons, should be called simultaneously, they have thought fit on this occasion to issue Writs to fill only a few of the many vacancies, one of which is West Queens.

I have been honored by my party in this riding as their standard bearer and in being the determination of the Liberal Conservative Party and of our respected Leader, Mr. R. L. Borden that the seat should be contested I am a candidate for your suffrages.

At the last session of Parliament the Liberal Conservative party fought the issue of the Grand Trunk Pacific Deal—a scheme which was sprung upon Parliament without the assent of the session without mandate from the people of Canada and the carrying out of which would result in immense expenditure of public money and incur a liability estimated from one hundred and twenty to one hundred and forty millions of dollars.

As you are aware the Liberal Conservative party were joined in their protest against the scheme by all the Independent members of Parliament and by the Hon. Mr. Blair, Minister of Railways, one of the ablest members of the Cabinet, who resigned his cabinet position in protest.

The limited time at my disposal will not permit me to call personally upon all the electors and I take this means of asking for your support on the 16th day of February next. I shall if elected join with those representatives of the people in Parliament who oppose the Grand Trunk Pacific Deal.
