**IN MEMORIAM**

**MISS CHRISTIE McDOUGALL**  
1851—1917

There passed away at Hampton on December 20th, 1917, Miss Christie McDougall. The deceased had lived for a number of years in the United States, but failing health had caused her to return home, about three years ago. Although she was carefully tended by kind relatives and friends, she did not seem to improve, and died trusting faithfully in the promises of the Saviour. She was attended in her last illness by the Rev. J. S. McKie, of Hampton, who also conducted the funeral service. There are left to mourn two brothers, Angus and Desable, Robert at home; also two sisters, Annie at home and Catherine in Colorado. Another sister, Mary, who died in Boston during the spring of 1917, was brought home in May last, and buried in the family plot in the public cemetery at Crapaud. **WILLIAM JOHN EVANS**  
William John Evans, killed Nov. 5th, 1917, while at work on the new B. C. Telephone building. The accident was due to a noisy auto on the street. Mr. Evans was born at Burlington, June 9th, 1857, was a son of the late William P. and Isabella Evans, of that place. He moved with his family to Vancouver, B. C., about thirteen years ago, and has worked at his trade as carpenter ever since. He made many friends and was highly respected by all. He was a man of boundless hospitality, great courage and good sense, and always of quiet and gentle disposition. He had an abiding faith in the righteousness of God's dealings, no matter how hard it seemed. All who knew him loved him, but the angels loved him better so they took him to a land where he would be free from the trials and sorrows of this world.

How pure and gentle as though asleep, while the sweet calm expression thereon seemed to say "I did in the next and better world of Him who gave His life for me." All feel his loss greatly. A large and sympathetic congregation assembled to witness the last sad rites and listen to the funeral service which was conducted by the Church of England minister, the Rev. Mr. Howarth, who acted as one of sympathy and impressiveness. The floral tributes were beautiful. The deceased leaves to mourn a bereaved widow and four children, Mrs. William Nelson, New Westminster, B.C., Mrs. Hiram Clumpton, Vancouver, B.C., Mrs. Margaret Leighton, Vancouver, B.C., also one sister, Mrs. Edwin Paynter, Burlington, P.E.I. Mrs. Evans was the youngest daughter of the late James Bernard, Baltic, P.E.I. The heartfelt sympathy of friends and relatives goes out to the sorrowing family. But the hand that chastens will also uphold to sustain and uphold them in their hour of loneliness and grief.

**PERCY W. CARVER**

Mr. Percy W. Carver, a well-known Boston lawyer, and for several years troop master of troop 4, Boy Scouts, of this village, died on Friday of last week, after an illness of three days, of pneumonia, says the Newton Citizen of Dec. 12. He was the son of Richard and Hannah Gay Carver and was born at Pownal, Prince Edward Island, on July 21, 1871. He graduated from the Prince of Wales College at Charlottetown in 1888. Following graduation he was private secretary to Sir Louis Henry Davies, minister of marine and fisheries in the Laurier Cabinet. Subsequently he read law in the office of Davis & Hazard, for three years. He came to Boston as a clerk in the firm of Carver & Blodgett, soon after entering the Boston University law school, from which he received the degree of LL. B. in 1896, being admitted to the Suffolk bar the same year. He entered the firm of Eaton, McKnight & Carver, where he soon assumed charge of important cases. About 12 years ago he left this office and conducted his business independently, a year ago taking into partnership his brother, Arthur G. Carver, of Allston, the firm being known as Carver & Carver.

He was a member of the Hammat Lodge, A. F. & A. M., of East Boston, and subsequently of Dalhousie lodge, newtonville, of St. James chapter, R. A. M., of Boston council R. L. M., of Dunster lodge, I. O. O. F., and of Charles River encampment of Cambridge, and of De Molay commandery, K. T.

He married Miss Lottie Jean Small of Charlottetown who, together with a young son and daughter, survive him. His father, a brother, Arthur G. and a sister, the wife of Mr. Ernest Westmoreland of St. John, New Brunswick, also survive him.

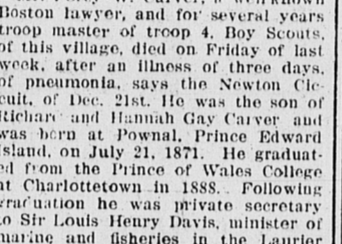
