THE BURDICK MURDER CASE.

For weeks past many of our exchanges have teemed with references to the Burdick murder case, the false theories of the police, the arrest of persons supposed to be implicated and afterward admitted to be free from complicity in the affair, the arrest of a Canadian girl, and the indignities to which she was subjected, her action against the city of Buffalo for damages, and many other matters. At latest accounts the police are completely baffled in their efforts to find the murderer.

E. F. Burdick was found murdered in his private "den" in his residence, Ashland Avenue, Buffalo, on Friday morning, February 27th. He was lying on his face on a divan, almost undressed, with a quilt and some rugs over him, his head battered frightfully from many blows delivered by some heavy, blunt weapon which has not been found. His sister was the first to discover the awful tragedy, her attention having been called by the servant to the fact that there was something wrong in the room.

Burdick was a member of the fashionable fast circle of Buffalo's wealthy society. He lived a dissipated, licentious life, and his wife, who bears a wholesome name, had separated from him in consequence of his immoralities. As the murder was obviously not committed for gain, other motives must be sought for, and the police appear to have been searching for some person actuated by fear or revenge. They suspect that some woman had first drugged and then beaten Burdick to death while in an unconscious condition.

So far as the investigation has gone it has been, as we have said, fruitless of direct evidence implicating any one. But it has disclosed many facts which cast a lurid light upon the immoralities of the fashionable circles of Buffalo. It is a gruesome story indeed, of which our readers may well be spared further details.

A PENITENTIARY OFFENCE.

In view of the bribery charges made by Mr. Gamey and other like charges that have been made from time to time in the past of attempts not always unsuccessful, to corrupt the integrity of elected representatives of the people, it cannot be too widely made known that the offence is in the eye of the law a very grave one. And most properly so. Pending the investigation of Gamey's charges all discussion of the guilt of the accused is properly suspended. But if the charges are hereafter proven the offender has been guilty of a penitentiary offence, the penalty for which is fourteen years imprisonment. Here is the law:—

Every one is guilty of an indictable offence and liable to fourteen years imprisonment who—

(a) Holding any judicial office or being a member of parliament or of a legislature, corruptly accepts or obtains, or agrees to accept, or attempts to obtain for himself or any other person, any money or valuable consideration, office, place or employment on account of anything already done or omitted, or to be afterwards done or omitted, by him in his judicial capacity or in his capacity as such member; or (b) corruptly gives or offers to any such person or to any other person any such bribe as aforesaid on account of any such act or omission. (Criminal Code of Canada, page 128).

The Patriot expresses a desire that The Guardian should deal with 'stock-gambling' from a moral standpoint. The Patriot tells that it has purposely refrained from handling the moral aspects of the question and we will not dispute the editor's estimate of his own usefulness for that purpose of discussion. But we think that when Rev. G. M. Young dealt with this subject so faithfully and earnestly before the Y. M. C. A. last Sunday, and when The Guardian afterward printed a three column report of what he had to say, The Patriot might at least have made some mention of the discourse, if only as a matter of news. It suited The Patriot to ignore Mr. Young's deliverance and to call upon The Guardian to speak. This course of action does not bear a very strong impress of sincerity.

Bible Society, \$500.00; Halifax Deaf and Dumb Institute, \$500.00; Poor Fund, St. John, \$500.00; his niece, Isabel's Bealisto, \$500.00; Margaret Bealisto, his grand niece \$500.00; Helen Bealisto, \$500.00; James McLaurin, his nephew, \$200.00; John McLaurin, \$200.00; William McLaurin, \$200.00; Robert McLaurin, his brother-in-law, \$500.00; Annie McDonald, \$500.00; William McGowan, \$500.00. The executors of the estate are Robert McLaurin, T. C. James and George Stanley.
