It states the effect of Nova Scotia lobsters on current prices. It is only during the present period of the season that anything like an average catch is being made along the south shore. Lobsters are really scarce in reach of the average person just now, tho there is no chance that they will ever be as low as they once were. Still the price has declined, and this too on both the live and boiled varieties. The influx of the Nova Scotia lobsters has been the cause of whatever drop has taken place. They are arriving by the hundreds of thousands in Boston, and some of the Maine dealers, have already received shipments which have been placed in the pounds where they will be kept for the time being. But actual lobster arrivals in Portland have been few and far between lately. Boston has held the center of the market and a good part of the big buying has been with the Boston dealers.
