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## OTTAWA AGREEMENTS REAFFIRMED

### WORLD CONFERENCE ADJOURNS INDEFINITELY

#### Optimistic Note Is Sounded By British Premier

#### SOVIET WHACKS AGREEMENT IS POSSIBLE

#### Bitter Criticism of World Parley By Soviet Delegate.

LONDON, July 27.—(C. P. Cable)—The World Economic Conference today adjourned indefinitely with British and United States leaders joining in declarations work must be resumed at the earliest opportunity.

Five hours of speechmaking, in which some of the leading delegates frankly confessed very little progress had been made, were capped by declaration of Prime Minister Ramsay MacDonald, Chairman of the Conference, and President Franklin D. Roosevelt of the United States.

#### STEEL AND RAIL STOCKS RECORD RISE

NEW YORK, July 27.—Board advances in grain prices overshadowed the efforts of stocks today, although shares managed to spurge in certain sections notably the steel and rail groups.

Rail stocks at one time got up 1 to 3 points or so, but finished mostly under their highs. The strikingly favorable June earnings plus assurance that last week's loadings had maintained the largest percentage gains over a year ago shown in recent weeks, even though the total would probably be under the immediately preceding period, gave strength to the carriers. Steels came forward at the finish in anticipation of an improved earnings statement by Bethlehem as well as the prospect of new business from the Government's naval construction.

#### AIR ARMADA PREPARES FOR LONGEST JUMP

#### Seized With Cramp, Drowns

HALIFAX, July 27.—Seized with a cramp while swimming in the northwest arm of Halifax Harbor, Milton Martell, 16, was drowned this evening. Fellow swimmers went to the aid of the boy when he sank, but he was dead when brought to shore a few minutes later.

#### Crashes On Solo Flight

#### Fire Threatens Whole Village Near Moncton

#### Blaze Wipes Out Twenty-one Buildings In Albert—Damage Is Estimated At About \$61,000.

MONCTON, July 27.—Fire which broke out in the village of Albert, Albert County, 35 miles from Moncton, early this afternoon, wiped out 21 buildings and threatened the entire village before brought under control by the Albert Fire Department assisted by a large number of volunteer fire fighters gathered from all sections of the surrounding country, including a piece of apparatus from the Moncton Fire Department. The loss which included the total destruction of seven residences, two stores, ten buildings, a warehouse and a woodworking shop, is estimated at about \$61,000.

#### PRIVY COUNCIL DISMISSES ALBERTA CASE

Alberta Government Loses Duties of \$60,000 by Council's Decision.

Cable)—Ruling portions of the old Alberta Succession Duties Act were ultra vires the Privy Council today dismissed the Alberta Government's appeal from a decision of the Alberta Court of Appeal. The judgment meant the Alberta Government loses duties of \$60,000 it sought to levy on the estate of the late I. K. Kerr.

Chipman, barrister to contest that constituency for the government. The government under Premier G. S. Harrington and the Liberal opposition led by Angus L. MacDonald each have chosen 36 men for the province's 30 ridings. Six Labor and C. O. P. candidates are also in the fight.
