Major MacNutt Addresses Rotary
 At the Rotary luncheon yesterday the guest speaker was Major T. E. MacNutt, Manager of the Canadian Legion Campaign in this Province, launched to raise \$4,000 for the purpose of supplying services to the men who are serving in Canada and overseas.

The total objective set for Canada is \$500,000. Major MacNutt explained why the money is needed and how it will be spent. None of it goes directly to the Legion but will go to an auxiliary under separate charter. Rotarian Norville Luck was in the chair, and Don Archibald read a letter which Major MacNutt had previously written to the club in regard to the Legion Campaign. At the close of Major MacNutt's address a vote of thanks, moved by Dr. MacIntyre, Vice President, and seconded by Percy W. Turner, Past District Governor, was tendered to the speaker who was assured of the sincere interest and cooperation of the Rotary Club.

District Governor Clark announced that the 1940 convention which had been first scheduled for Rio de Janeiro had been cancelled and will be held in Havana from June 6th to 14th.

"HUNS" IN BAD WAY—The Hungarian partridges in the Province are suffering intensely and some cases dying of starvation from the want of food and grit. A hard crust of snow under the recent snowfall has made it impossible for them to reach the grass which is their mainstay and unless a thaw comes soon or interested sportsmen take some action to see that the birds are fed, there is a danger that the "huns" may disappear from the Island. Numbers of the birds have already died of starvation and when they were cut open for examination, it was discovered that there was not a particle of grit or food in the crops or intestines. Besides the grass grit, in the form of clay or gravel is absolutely necessary for the welfare of the birds, especially when they resort to a diet of grain which they glean from stacks.

Islander Serves in Third War
 The present war is unearthing the whereabouts of long absent and almost forgotten Islanders of the type who have the commendable habit of turning up when the Empire is in trouble.

Worthy of an honoured place among these roving patriotic Islanders is James D. Mathieson. Jim Mathieson is a son of the late Rudrick Mathieson who for many years was station policeman at the Charlottetown station. As a youngster he went to South Africa with the Canadian contingent, where he served with the infantry and later with the light horse. South African veterans still living here remember him for his care-free bravery, good nature and fine soldierly qualities. After the South African war he returned to Charlottetown and was employed with the firm of Bruce Stewart's. But Western Canada had attracted him and he located there some years prior to the war of 1914, leaving in Winnipeg when that conflict broke out. He joined the famous Princess Patricia's Battalion composed entirely of veterans of Empire wars. Jim was in all of the terrific engagements in which the "Pats" took part in the early days in France until he suffered a severe leg wound, which removed him from the fighting front. Marked as unfit for further service he was booked for Canada and at that time had decided to return for a time at least to his home in Charlottetown. But war had one more little adventure for him which was unexpected. The hospital ship on which he embarked for Canada was torpedoed off the Irish Coast, and after being rescued from the sinking vessel Jim landed in Ireland. Later he was sent with other wounded to Leith, Scotland, and after his discharge he made his home in that Scottish seaport.

This past summer, just prior to war, he had once again prepared to leave for Canada, and his family in this city which included a number of brothers and sisters, had expected that he would make his permanent home once more in Charlottetown.

Then came the British declaration of war on September 3, and Mr. Mathieson once again offered his services. Still bothered by the old leg wound he could not be accepted for service in France. He was however passed for home service and is now on active duty as a dockyard detective at Leith. Although under army pay and regulations his duties are of such a nature that he does not wear khaki; his work has to do with the prevention of sabotage.
