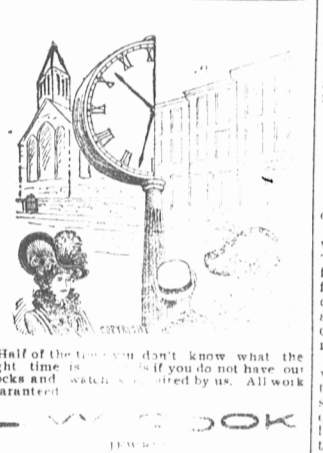

CLUB WILL APOLOGIZE TO THE TWO MINISTERS

Blackballing Incident Will be Closed by Removal of the Ban.

OTTAWA, March 9.—There will be a general meeting of the members of the Rideau Club on the 14th inst., when a resolution will be passed regretting the disgraceful conduct of certain members who for political reasons recently organized to blackball a couple of Ministers of the Crown who had been privileged members of the club for many years.

Another resolution will be passed declaring that any one who was a privileged member of the club before March 1, will not be required to be elected as a full member. He will be entitled to full membership without a second election.

Although the Rideau club has been recognized as a strongly Conservative institution it is only fair to say that the great majority of the club has no sympathy with the disgraceful tactics of the few who have recently brought ridicule upon it.

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WASHINGTON.

It doesn't take much to set civilized nations celebrating and telling each other of the evening that he was a jolly good fellow and that it would be perfectly absurd under the circumstances to go home before morning. Across the border during the last two months the anniversary of Lincoln's and of Washington's birthday gave occasion for much praise of the heroes and much avariness to the diners, in the form of patriotic speeches. If ever a man has suffered at the hands of his injudicious friends, it is George Washington. He has been pictured as a piling little and whom every human child must hate, prig the color has been well-nigh washed from a character that was, really, robust and manly. As a soldier, Washington hardly stands among the world's greatest since he was nearly always unsuccessful in attack and showed an especial genius for the warring game. Marlborough, to say nothing of Napoleon, went away ahead of George the First of the White House. It was, rather, in the elastic days after the free and equal States began to settle down and the "loyalists" about their business, that Washington's administrative power showed its real scope and strength. He remained singularly an Englishman—of the Hampton type, with a touch of the Southern aristocrat. He would be as ill at ease as the Earl of Chatham himself in the modern republic of trusts and combines. Lincoln is much closer to the popular idea of the United States' leader—a man of the working-people, rugged, shrewd, uncooth, with a strength that was undimmed when confronted by the bloodiest war of the last century—a man of cool head, steady hand and, withal, of kindly heart. It is poor work to prophesy—most of us will not be alive a hundred years from now, unless it may be a stray senator or so. But, in the year 2004 Lincoln's legacy may yet be held for, to borrow Carlyle's estimate of Scott, there was no sounder piece of American leadership put together in the nineteenth century than Abraham Lincoln.

SULTAN'S CONDITIONS TO RUSSIA FOR PASSAGE OF DARDANELLES

The Black Sea Fleet Cannot Pass Down With Turkey's Consent Without Concessions by Russia Which the Czar Would be Very Slow to Grant, so His Ships of War Will Probably Stay Where They Are.

BERLIN, March 8.—The Porte has thus far met the requests of the Russian Ambassador to Turkey M. Sinovieff, to permit the Black Sea fleet to pass the Dardanelles by naming conditions wholly unacceptable to Russia. These conditions naturally are that Russia shall break off or evade the fulfilment of her agreement with Austria respecting the Balkans, give the Sultan leave to settle the controversy by his own methods, and assist Turkey, should Austria or other powers dispute the Sultan's decisions. Russia rejected these proposals as preposterous, but she renewed her request, to which here seems little likelihood of the Sultan yielding, as British diplomacy is active at Constantinople, in urging on the Porte a strict observance of the Berlin treaty. France, so far, as can be perceived here, has not seconded Russia in this matter.

Such a step as permitting the Black Sea fleet to pass the Dardanelles would be regarded diplomatically as a breach of neutrality on the part of Turkey. Russia's diplomatic weight at Constantinople has been somewhat reduced by the occurrences in the Far East. The Porte will give nothing without a heavy price. Germany expresses no opinion on the subject. The government can conceive of a time when it would be Germany's advantage to have a portion of the Russian navy locked up in the Bosphorus and the Dardanelles. Austria and Italy are not moving at Constantinople where all the powers expect Russia and Great Britain are quiet. Russia would not use the Dardanelles now if she could, in the opinion of experts here, because her Black Sea fleet is not ready for a Far Eastern campaign, and if it were ready, Russia would wait until her Baltic fleet is thoroughly equipped. It is believed that Russia could not hope for a decisive naval success without the Baltic, Black Sea and Mediterranean squadrons uniting and proceeding east to gether, as otherwise they would be destroyed piecemeal.

GRAND MASTER OF THE GRAND LODGE

Elected at the Meeting of Grand Lodge in St. Stephen—Next Meeting to be Held at Sussex Second Tuesday March 1905.

ST. STEPHEN, N. B., March 9.—The attendance at the grand lodge was considerably augmented at this morning's session.

Though the instrumentality of the Grand Lodge of P. E. Island, a movement has been inaugurated to institute an orphanage for the children of deceased Orangemen and a committee was appointed to meet similar committees from Nova Scotia and P. E. Island in June next. The latter bodies have endorsed the movement and already appointed their committees. The New Brunswick committee consists of R. G. Magee, H. G. Wadman and Rev. A. G. Dresser.

The committee on correspondence presented a lengthy report. Among the important sections were:

1. Endorsing the imperial federation scheme as enunciated through Right Hon. Joseph Chamberlain.
 2. Recommending an increase in the salary of the grand secretary.
 3. Expressing sympathy with the little Britain of the Orient in its struggle with despotic Russia.
 4. That Canada is becoming the dumping ground of the Jesuits and other bigoted Roman Catholic orders that have been expelled from France and other Roman Catholic countries is a matter that closely touches this order. Loving freedom as we do there comes the chance that we go to the length of allowing these orders in addition to place their talons in the dearest institutions of the country. It is the business of this order to see to it that this great wrong be checked before it is too late. We must do this through the medium of fearless speech and action.
- The committee on constitutions recommended that certain committees be permitted to hold their annual session late in the fall instead of in February.
- The credential committee submitted a report showing more than 100 delegates present.

Clark, grand D. of C., Moncton; A. R. Mowatt, D. G. Sec'y., McAdam; Rev. O. N. Mott, D. G. C., Wilson's Beach; Rev. B. H. Thomas, D. G. C., Dorchester; Rev. R. G. Fulton, D. G. C., Hampton; Rev. I. N. Horne, D. G. C., Northumberland; Rev. A. W. Currie, D. G. C., Kings county; Rev. A. F. Brown, D. G. C., Albert county; Rev. J. C. Blakeney, D. G. C., Woodstock.
