Whaler Arrives With \$6,000,000 Cargo

LIVERPOOL, England, May 12 (Reuters) — The 14,000-ton British whaler factory ship Southern Venturer arrived here today

from the Antarctic to discharge a cargo of whalemeat and whale oil worth more than \$1,500,000 (\$6,000,000). During the seven months' whaling season catcher ships attached to the Southern Venturer made record catches yielding 200,000 barrels of whale and sperm oil and 2,700 tons of whalemeat.

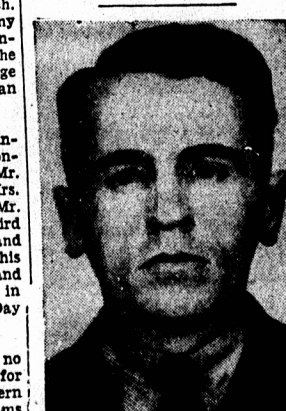

Weekly Live Stock Market Report

SUMMARY Cattle deliveries showed considerable pickup in the past week and there was a recession in western prices of 50c to 1.50. Eastern markets, however, absorbed a heavier run at advances of 25c to 50c to establish a new high in Toronto. Most calf markets were up 50c to \$1.00 except Winnipeg where a decline of \$3 to \$5 was recorded. Hogs were unchanged and a small supply of lambs were strong sellers.

Eastern Cattle Markets

The heaviest cattle run so far this year was taken at an advance of 25c at Toronto under a keen demand. A new high was established, with weighty steers going at \$18.50 to \$18.85 and a few \$19, and butcher steers selling up to \$18.50 and choice as high as \$19.25. Trading was active at Montreal at an advance of 25c to 50c, good steers bringing up to \$18 and a few choice \$18.50 and \$19. In the Maritimes, choice steers and heifers were quoted at \$18.50 country points.

Western Cattle Markets

With receipts showing some increase following the recent moderate runs, prices on western markets were lower by 50c to \$1.50. Winnipeg led \$1 to \$1.50, selling the better grades of steers at the close at a practical top of \$18, with other desirable kinds \$17 to \$17.50. Medium to good stockers and feeders were shipped at \$11.50 to \$14.50. Calgary opened higher with a load of steers selling early at \$15.25, while the general range on good to choice steers was \$17 to \$18.50. The early advance was lost by the close. Edmonton was down fully 50c, with choice steers \$18.25, while Prince Albert paid up to \$18. Moose Jaw an odd \$18.25 and mostly \$18 down, Regina \$18.25, and Saskatoon \$18.50.

Exports to United States

Dairy cattle exports to the United States for the week totalled 2,549 compared with 1,019 in the same week last year. Exports since January 1st this year amount to 25,518 compared with 14,066 in the same period last year.

Calves Generally Stronger

With the exception of Winnipeg and Edmonton, calf markets were higher. Toronto gained \$1.00, selling best veals at \$20 to \$23, while Montreal was up 50c to \$1.00 with the top at \$20 and an odd sale at \$21. Winnipeg broke \$3 to \$5, with the top at \$20, while Calgary veals sold to a high of \$18.50, Edmonton \$19 and \$19.50, Prince Albert \$18, Moose Jaw up to \$19, Regina \$20, Saskatoon \$21, and Moncton \$15.

Hogs Continue Strong

Hogs were for the most part unchanged but were strong sellers, with slight gains made at one or two markets. Grade A hogs sold at Toronto at \$28, Montreal \$29.00 to \$29.25, Winnipeg \$27.50, Calgary stronger at \$28, Edmonton \$28.25, Prince Albert, Moose Jaw, Regina and Saskatoon \$27.25, Vancouver \$28.50 to \$28.70, and Moncton \$28.70. The above prices do not include the Dominion Government premium of \$2 per head on Grade A and \$1 per head on Grade B1.
