Mr. J. D. O'Connell Dies In Cuba

SUSSEX, Oct. 28 (Special) — J. D. O'Connell, philanthropist widely known as "the orphan friend" has died in Hattuey, Cuba, it was learned here today. Born in Kings County, he died Oct. 1 at the age of 60 and was buried at Camaguey the following day.

Mr. O'Connell went to Camaguey years ago, to relieve suffering in the welfare of orphans. He endowed several Canadian orphanages but was best known for his distribution of money and gifts to poor children, and frequently was host at picnics for orphans.

In recognition of his philanthropic work he was made a Freeman of the City of Saint John last February — the highest civic honor which the Common Council is empowered to award.

James D. O'Connell was born near Havelock, Kings County, and always resided in Hattuey, a suburb, intermittently until his sudden death.

Most of his life was devoted to the welfare of orphans. He endowed several Canadian orphanages but was best known for his distribution of money and gifts to poor children, and frequently was host at picnics for orphans.

After his early business career he purchased a sugar plantation at Hattuey, where he resided for several years. His time was devoted to helping orphaned children.

He started this with a picnic at Hattuey, in 1909. Subsequently, he organized the "Orphan's Home" in the United States and Cuba. The picnic became an annual event, and in addition a Christmas gift was given to each child.

The "orphans' friend" added \$100 to the \$2,500 trust fund he had already established for Saint John orphans. This fund enables the mayor to distribute 25 cents to each orphaned child in the city at Christmas, and added interest may be spent, at the mayor's discretion, for the benefit of the orphans.

He founded a \$30,000 "working boys' home" at Killam, Alta, and assisted needy children of Sussex, Saint John, Halifax, Charlottetown and other parts of Canada as well as in the United States.

Several years ago Mr. O'Connell was adopted as a son of Camaguey in recognition of his philanthropic efforts. The late Sir William Van Horne, who resided during the summer in St. Andrews N.B., was the only other man who ever received this honor. Sir William built the Cuban railway.

Duchess Of Kent Shows Sketches

(Canadian Press) LONDON, Oct. 30. — The Duchess of Kent and A. V. Alexander, First Lord of the Admiralty, stopped in front of two portraits in a museum and color wash during a tour of a W.R.N.S. handicraft exhibition. One was labelled "Nanny" while the other was labelled "That is my boy." As they inspected the drawings the Duchess turned to the First Lord and said: "That is my son. And that is a young Polish friend, a lad of 18."

Mr. Alexander expressed admiration of the work, but he didn't learn until later that the sketches had been done by the Duchess.

EMPLOYEES GO OVER THE TOP

THE PAS MAN, Oct. 28 — Employees of the Hudson Bay Railway subsidiary of the Canadian National have gone over the top in the Fifth Victory Loan campaign. Subscriptions amounting to \$30,000 have been received from 200 employees. The quota was \$30,000. Returns are still coming in. The Hudson Bay Railway has 311 employees.

Slippers Galore But Few Coupons

Slippers of cut felt in bright shades of red, purple and green with open toes and heel straps cost about \$5.75. There are others with high fronts made of quilted rayon with each piece of quilting embroidered with tiny flowers. They are priced at the equivalent of \$6.15.

But it is the requirement of five coupons rather than the money that gets people from buying them.

Some shops sell fluffy soles and give directions how to crochet sandals top to them, or how to make them out of felt, which can be bought without surrendering coupons.

Ordinary walking and afternoon shoes require seven coupons now

On Friday evening Oct. 1st, there entered peacefully into rest at his residence in Bonshaw John A. MacDougall in his eighty-fourth year. His funeral was held Monday Oct. 4th in the absence of his pastor Rev. J. T. Beaton, the services were conducted at the house and grave by the Rev. D. J. Morrison of Bradshaw who also visited him during his illness. The late Mr. MacDougall was a member of the St. Andrew's Church, St. Beaton. The remains were interred to rest in Argyle Shore cemetery.
