



### FLOOD MENACE IN ONTARIO IS LESSENER

TORONTO, April 19 (CP)—Heavy rains for 24 hours sent rivers and streams of western Ontario today to flood level but as the skies cleared, the danger to riverine homes and farmlands lessened.

Rain and snow in the Grand Valley added 2-3 feet to the level of the Grand River and flood water seeped over nearby land. Flats were covered at Blair and Preston and below Elora, the river broke its banks but unless there is further rain little damage is anticipated.

At Stratford, the Avon River, normally only a trickle, rose four feet and grew into a torrent. A main road in St. Vincent township was flooded.

At Brantford, the Grand River reached its highest level of the year and went over its banks. Engineers reported it was still rising slowly but looked for no serious damage unless there is more rain. South of the city, the Grand River highway was closed at low-lying points.

**Scout News and Notices**

April 16, 1939

At the conclusion of the first term of the Boy Scout camp which will be a feature of the New York World's Fair, President Grover Whalen paid this tribute to Scouting: "We could not feel that this great exposition—international in character as it is, and representing all the social and economic needs of our country—would be complete if we did not have this Scout camp."

One of the noteworthy forms of service rendered Canadian youth through the Scout movement, in recognition of which Hon. Lt.-Col. J.H. Woods of Calgary was decorated by His Excellency the Lord Tweedsmuir, Chief Scout for Canada, with the Scout Silver Wolf, was the gift to Alberta Scouts of a splendid camp site on Sylvan Lake, near Edmonton. Each summer for some years "Camp Woods" has been a mecca for Scout campers and leaders attending training courses. Col. Woods is Provincial Scout Commissioner for Alberta.

An experiment of unusual interest in combining the principles of the Boy Scout system of training with those of the general educational system is being made by Dr. Maria Montessori, the world famous educationist. The experiment is being carried out in Holland with a number of Scout leaders are teaching the principles of Scouting to about fifty children in Dr. Montessori's schools.

Dr. Montessori states that she greatly admires the Scout Movement, "because it has filled an empty space in education and supplied a need of great human importance, especially for the development of moral standards." Scouting, she says, is most helpful for the training of character—a training which is lacking in ordinary school education.

His Worship Mayor Day of Toronto was once a Boy Scout in the 21st Toronto Scout Troop. Three Rover Scouts, two Australians and a Polish Rover, aboard a 50-foot yawl bound from Sydney to Glasgow, to attend a World Rover gathering, had the adventurous honour of running upon the same coral reef upon which Captain Cook was forced to beach his ship 137 years ago. After six days of Crusoe job of patching the bottom of their punctured craft, the Rovers proceeded, and later were reported at Timor, in the Dutch East Indies. They last reported from Port Said.

To mark the recent visit of President and Madame Lebrun to London, the following telegram was sent by Lord Somers, Deputy Chief Scout, to the Bureau Inter-federal of the Boy Scouts of France:

"On occasion of visit of Monsieur le President to His Majesty King George, British Boy Scouts send warmest greetings to their brother Scouts in France. Monsieur Witt-Guizot, President of the Bureau Inter-federal, replied: "In the name of the French nation a hundred thousand French Scouts acclaim King George and Queen Elizabeth and send greetings to their brother Scouts of Britain in honour of the visit of President Lebrun."

A dozen pigs and 20,000 hens will be called upon to supply the morning bacon and eggs for the 5,000 Rover Scouts from all parts of the world, save dictator countries, who will gather at Monzie Castle, Scotland, in July for the 3rd World Rover Moot. The figures were given at luncheon of the Glasgow City Business Club by Lord Rowallan, President of the Scottish Boy Scouts Association. Other food items for the 8,000 husky diners include 40 tons of bread, 5 tons of cakes and biscuits, 10,000 lbs. of fish, 40,000 lbs. of fruit and vegetables, 4 tons of sugar, one ton of coffee and cocoa. As far as possible all foodstuffs will be the produce of Scotland. Where this is impossible, British Empire products will be used.
