POLAR WAVE IN AUSTRIA.

VIENNA, Jan. 28.—The most intense cold prevails throughout Eastern Austria. Two gendarmes have been seen to death near Kaschau, Hungary, about 130 miles north-east of Budapest. Other cases are reported of peasants overtaken by snowstorms and frozen.

KILLING MICROBES.

By Current of Electricity by Bishop Newman's Case.

NEW YORK, Jan. 26.—Bishop John P. Newman of the Methodist Episcopal Church of California, after a month's treatment in this city with the electric current, is favorably impressed by Nicola Tesla's proposition to make an apparatus of enormous voltage which will destroy all health killing microbes or germs in the human system. Bishop Newman considers the results achieved by electricity in his case marvellous. He thinks that, were it not for this wonderful force, he would be an invalid almost and a cripple today.

The Bishop received an injury many years ago, the effects of which lay dormant and which, he thinks, might have developed into locomotor ataxia if it had not been for the use of the electric current.

The Bishop, in an interview said: "A year ago I became so weak that I had to give up walking, and practically abandoned work. I came east a month ago for medical treatment and visited a physician who makes a speciality of electricity.

"While passing the current through me, which is done with the aid of electrodes and a wet sponge, in pretty much the same way, I suppose, as they kill prisoners in Sing Sing—although, of course, he used a smaller current on me—he discovered a lesion at the base of the spine, due to my accident in California, and which I had entirely overlooked.

"Since then I have had the diffusive system of electricity applied to me for one and two hours at a time several days a week. I am almost completely well again and can walk excellently. I am going to the annual meeting of my church in Richmond in a few days, an event at which I did not hope to be present."

Bishop Newman, who is a magnificent specimen of the old-fashioned, courteous gentleman, looks the picture of health. His face is ruddy, his complexion bright and his eyes clear. When he came to the Murray Hill Hotel four weeks ago he looked a physical wreck.

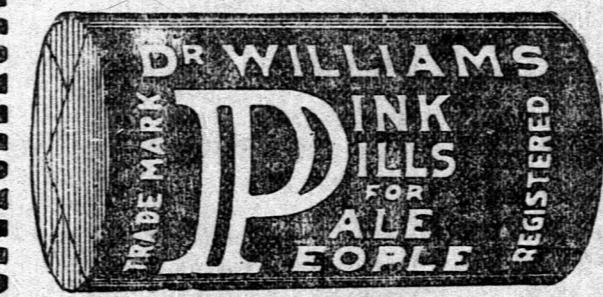

TO LEAD LIBERAL PARTY.

LONDON, January 30.—It is now practically settled that Sir H. Campbell Bannerman will lead the Liberal party in the house of commons, with Mr. H. Asquith as his first lieutenant. Mr. Asquith is making a considerable income at the bar, and he would have to relinquish this were he to accept the leadership in the commons. He has offered to do it, but it is felt by the party managers that it is exacting from him too great a sacrifice as matters stand at present. Should however, the next election be carried by the Liberal party it is on the cards that Sir H. Campbell-Bannerman would take a passage after a short period of leadership in the lower house, and thus make way for Mr. Asquith.
