PRINCE STREET SCHOOL.

The recent very hasty action of the City  
Council and the School Board in consent-  
ing to the appropriation of a portion of  
Prince Street school grounds for the for-  
mation of a new street seems to call for  
a few words of comment. In the first  
place it is to be observed that should the  
proposed street be made it will take away  
about one-third of an acre of the already  
sufficiently small play-ground of the  
school. It is only the portion of the school  
lot north of the school that is available  
or play, and this being less than two  
acres in area is quite small enough for the  
large and increasing number of pupils—  
about 600.

It is further to be observed that the pro-  
posed street would take away the play-  
ground without affording the advantages  
to the general public which an ordinary  
street would give, because the proposed  
street runs at an acute angle instead of  
square across the land between Upper  
Prince and School streets. It would not  
connect with any other streets running in  
the same direction either east or west.  
All persons are familiar with the advan-  
tages of having streets cross at right  
angles instead of at acute or obtuse angles.  
Equally all are aware of the importance  
of streets connecting, or extending  
through the town in the same direction.  
This would be impossible with the pro-  
posed street.

On a calm survey of the situation we  
are convinced that both the City Council  
and the School Board have acted with-  
out sufficient consideration in this  
matter and have taken a wrong  
course which ought to be retraced. We  
cannot too carefully guard against en-  
croachments upon the City Parks and  
breathing-places, nor upon the too scant  
allotment of play-grounds for the school-  
children. In this case the desire seems  
to have been to secure with as little cost  
as possible a cross street from Upper  
Prince to School Street which may be need-  
ed. The proposed new street being at an  
angle would be much longer and vastly  
less convenient than one made at right  
angles with Upper Prince, and besides  
this it neither begins nor ends where  
cross street is most needed.

**THE POWERS AND CHINA.**

The claims which the European powers  
have made against China for compensa-  
tion in respect of the Boxer outrages may  
well appall the celestial mind. According  
to the published statements Russia dem-  
ands \$37,500,000, Germany nearly as much,  
France \$53,000,000, the United States \$25,  
000,000, Britain \$22,000,000 and large sums  
are asked also by Holland, Spain, Italy  
and Austria, which could not have suffer-  
ed materially and have done little or noth-

ing to restore order. Just how much Jap-  
an will insist upon we are not at present  
informed, but she has borne a very large  
share—much larger than any other power  
than Russia—in the war that has been  
carried on by the powers seeking redress.  
It will be seen with satisfaction by those  
of our nation who possess some sense of  
justice that while Britain indisputably  
suffered most in the persons of her out-  
raged subjects as well as in material in-  
terests, hers is one of the smaller claims  
for indemnity. Most of the powers have  
disgraced themselves in their method of  
conducting the war by massacre and pill-  
age, and China has already suffered more  
than them all, but the guns of grab, or  
partition seems likely to be played out to  
the bitter end. China cannot pay the en-  
ormous bills demanded. But China may  
some day repay with interest the outrages  
which the powers have inflicted.

There seems to be practically no limit  
to the size of the ocean steamers of the  
future except the limit of harbor accom-  
modation. The Celtic, recently launched  
at Belfast is more than twice as long as  
the new English battleships and more  
than double their displacement. She is 20  
feet longer than the Great Eastern and  
displaces 10,300 tons more water as she  
floats. The builders say it is practicable to  
build a steamship 1,000 feet in length. On  
ocean lines where there is heavy traffic the  
large ships are most economical in many  
ways. One way in which they economise  
is in officers and men. A 17,000 ton freight  
steamer could be run with six officers and  
100 men. Four steamers of 4,000 tons each  
would require 16 officers and 300 men.  
Thus the expenses for officers would be  
decreased five eighths in the larger ship  
and two thirds for men, as compared with  
four ships aggregating the same tonnage.
