The general regret expressed by all over the departure of Professor Watts from our midst and the hearty appreciation of his services during the time he has been with us, were evidenced by the large and representative audience assembled last night in the First Methodist Church. The occasion was Professor Watts' farewell recital, and they were fortunate indeed who were able to be present and enjoy the splendid programme of vocal and instrumental music carried out by Prof. Watts, ably assisted by Miss Hazel Brenner and the First Methodist Choir. Prof. Watts rendered among other accompaniments, etc., a Nocturne in C. Minor, and Andantino and an offertoire in D., which were played with that grace of execution and mastery of detail known only to those who have spent years in its acquisition. Miss Brenner was in splendid form in her rendering of "These Are They," and seldom has her fine voice appeared to better advantage. The Choir sang two selections which were well rendered "Guide Me Heavenly Father" sang as a solo by G. I. Moore was appreciated and "The Island Hymn," "God be with You till we Meet Again" and "God Save the King" were the concluding numbers. A pleasing feature of the evening was the presentation to Prof. Watts by the Church and Sunday School of an address and purse, the former expressing appreciation of the Professor's services in the past, regret at his departure and best wishes for his future success; the latter a tangible evidence of the esteem in which he is held. WORKMEN BELIEVED TO HAVE WON. OTTAWA, Aug. 29.—F. A. Acland, Deputy Minister of Labor, returned this morning from Port William, where the strike had been settled. The Board of Conciliation has reached a unanimous finding, but the signature of one of the parties it awaited. It is learned, however, that the men won out. They were getting eighteen and a half cents per hour for day, and twenty cents for night work, and a substantial increase is granted, as well as other minor concessions.
