Synopsis of Canadian North-West HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS.

ANY unoccupied section of Dominion Land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, excepting 20 or more acres, may be homesteaded by any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section (60 or more acres).

Applications for entry must be made in person by the applicant at a Dominion Land Agency or Subagency for the district in which the land is situated. Entry by proxy may, however, be made at an Agency on certain conditions by the father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of any intending homesteader.

The homesteader is required to perform the homestead duties under one of the following plans:

- (1) At least six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year for three years.
- (2) A homesteader may, if he so desire perform the required residence duties by living on farming land owned solely by him, not less than eighty (80) acres in extent, in the vicinity of his homestead, or upon a homestead entered for by him in the vicinity which homesteader may perform his own residence duties by living with his father, or mother, in a direct line, exclusive of the width of road allowances crossed in the measurement.
- (3) A homesteader intending to perform his residence duties in accordance with the above while living with parents or on farming land owned by himself must notify the Agent for the district of such intention.
- (4) Six months' notice in writing should be given to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa of intention to apply for the land.
