ROTARY CLUB—Rotarian J. A. Webster, President of the Automobile Association, gave an interesting talk on the marking of roads at Rotary Club yesterday. This work is being carried out by the Executive of the Association. Messrs. J. A. Webster, W. K. Rogers, W. S. Grant, A. A. Pomeroy, and Dr. Beer. The speaker explained that over a year ago Rotarian Palmer Kinsman offered to give the Association 500 signs, containing space for the names of the roads, also advertising matter. These signs were delivered too late last year to be made use of, but this spring the work of putting them up and of otherwise marking the roads was begun by the Executive. The Department of Public Works kindly loaned an auto truck to carry the paint and equipment. Work was started two weeks ago, and as the truck had to be taken off for other purposes, the marking had to be discontinued, to be resumed when it was again available. Mr. Webster then explained on a blackboard the marking of the roads, by means of white, yellow and red bands. These bands are painted on the telephone posts on each side of intersecting roads. The markings from Souris to Tignish are complete. From Tignish to Miramichi, from Miramichi to Fredericton. Signs will be posted at Borden and other points giving the "key" to the markings. Of the 500 signs given by Mr. Kinsman, 705 have been already put up. Mr. Webster's address was followed by an informal discussion and some practical suggestions were made. Rotarian Dr. Yeo, who made his first appearance at the Club since his illness, with his right arm in a sling, was tendered a great ovation, the boys rising and singing "For He's A Jolly Good Fellow." Rotarian Judge Arsenault was also given a rousing welcome.
