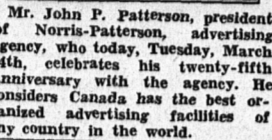

"Raw furs in the early days were the currency in many countries. The United States is the only government in the world to place a duty on raw furs, with perhaps the one exception of a war tax during the Great War, when two or three countries for a short time placed a small tax on raw furs."

"The effective date of the last three tariff acts enacted by the Congress of the United States were as follows: October 4, 1913; September 22, 1922; and June 28, 1930. The sections covering fox skins under these tariffs were as follows: '1913. Paragraph 348. Furs dressed on the skin, not advanced further than dyeing, 30 per cent ad valorem. Also paragraph 604. Skins of all kinds, raw, and hides, not specially provided for in this section.'
