SABBATH SCHOOL REPORT SUBMITTED

At Conference in Session at Fredericton.

Appointment of S. S. Secretary Discussed, Ordination Service Held—Rev. Mark Guy Pearse Preaches.

(From The Guardian correspondent.)

The conference of New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island continued in session Saturday forenoon. After the usual routine business the report of the Sabbath School Committee was presented by E. R. Macdonald of St. John and on motion was taken up section by section.

The section referring to the appointment of a paid Sunday School Secretary for New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island called forth considerable discussion. Those favoring the proposal urged the necessity of a competent man naming the Rev. A. Lucas who should visit the different localities and spend his whole time in the interest of the work.

Those opposed claimed that such an appointment would interfere with the work of the Provincial Association Secretaries.

A vote taken just before the adjournment placed the conference on record as favorable to the principle, but the section referring to the appointment of a man was laid on the table and made the order of the day for Monday. The conference adjourned at noon until Monday at 9 a.m.

On Sunday morning at 11 o'clock the ordination service was held and Rev. John J. Pinkerton was ordained for the work of the ministry. The service was conducted by the president of the conference assisted by the secretary and several of the ministers.

The Rev. Dr. Andrews of Mount Allison preached the Ordination Service from the text "We unto you lawyers" which he interpreted "preachers." The sermon contained more progressive thought than is usually looked for from Methodist ministers. He divided the subject under the following heads: "Evolution," "Higher Criticism," "Socialism" and "Materialism" and the sermon was considered a great effort.

Long before the hour for the evening service the spacious Fredericton Methodist Church was crowded to the doors and numbers were unable to get in to hear the Rev. Mark Guy Pearse, the preacher for the evening. No report would give any adequate idea of the sermon but would advise all who possibly can to hear his sermons in the First Methodist Church next Sunday and his lecture Monday night.

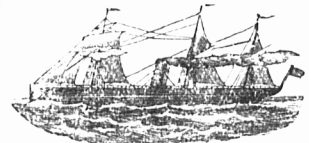
