Potato Growers Ask For Bonus

At a meeting of the farmers of Mt. Stewart and vicinity on May 18th in the Legion Hall Mr. D. J. MacDonald was appointed chairman and Mr. J. A. MacDonald as secretary, the following resolution was unanimously adopted:

Resolved that the potato growers of Mt. Stewart and surrounding districts join in a movement with other districts on Prince Edward Island in petitioning the federal government to pay a bonus on the Island potato crop of 1934 and that this bonus be \$10.00 an acre up to six acres. In consideration of the fact that the federal government has from time to time come to the assistance of the farmers in other provinces and that no such assistance has ever been given to the Prince Edward Island potato growers notwithstanding the fact that they have for several years lost considerable money in the past and present crisis.

Signed on behalf of the farmers of these districts, Kenneth Jay, D. F. Egan, D. J. MacDonald, J. A. MacDonald.

Potato Bonus

At a meeting of farmers of Lorne Valley and vicinity held in Lorne Valley Hall on May 20 to consider the potato bonus movement the following resolution was passed:

In consideration of the fact that potato growing is naturally adapted to the soil and the geographical location of Prince Edward Island and many farmers have equipped themselves at considerable expense to engage in the industry, and the fact that potatoes are the chief cash crop and all farmers have sustained a heavy loss on the 1934 crop and in the majority of cases find themselves heavily in debt. And in view of the fact that the federal government has granted large sums of money for the relief of farmers in Western Canada by

paying a bonus on wheat and all parts of Canada must contribute their proportionate share of such money used for relief purposes, therefore be it resolved that this meeting of farmers of Lorne Valley and vicinity endorse the movement to petition the federal government for a bonus of \$10 per acre on the 1934 crop to a maximum of six acres per farmer.
