IN MEMORIAM

**MRS. KEMBLE WEBSTER**

There passed peacefully away after a brief illness at the home of her son at West Royalty, on Friday, April 1, 1949, Mrs. Kemble Webster.

The late Mrs. Webster, who was in her 88th year, was born at Murray River, her maiden name being Miss Sadie Bears. Early in life she moved with her parents to Canso, Nova Scotia where she received her education and later taught school in Guysborough County for some thirteen years. She then returned to Prince Edward Island and settled at St. Peters where she taught music. Here she met and married Mr. Kemble Webster and settled on a farm at Marie where they lived for some sixty years. Their attractive home became the centre of hospitality and many were the relatives and friends who enjoyed her fellowship and kindness. The late Mrs. Webster was a devout Christian and a loyal worker in the cause of Christ at the church in Marie. The first Missionary Society in the Congregation was organized by her and she became its first President, which office she held for twenty years.

With her husband she moved to West Royalty three years ago, to take up residence with their son, Alfred. In her new locality she endeared herself to a wide circle of friends despite the fact that she was then ninety years of age. She was one who never seemed to grow old. Her keen interest in life and her pursuit of literary attainments and her winsome personality won for her the affection of both young and old. She kept up a wide correspondence, not only with her own family and friends in other parts of Canada and the United States of America, but also with relatives in South Africa.

She leaves to mourn the loss of a kind and loving mother three sons: Alfred at West Royalty, Lloyd of Vancouver, Walter of Saskatoon, and three daughters, Lida of Prince Albert, Sask., Georgie of Boston, who arrived home for the funeral, and Marion (Mrs. William E. Massey) of Charlottetown. She was predeceased by one son in 1911 and by her husband in the year 1948.

The funeral service was conducted in the Outcliffe Funeral Home on Monday, April 4th, by the Reverend Dr. Rice of Trinity United Church and the Reverend G. Carlyle Webster of Zion Church. Members of Trinity Choir, under the direction of Mr. A. Roy Kendall, led the service of praise. The pallbearers in Charlottetown were Messrs. Everett Webster, T. G. Ives, Bruce MacEwen and Willard Kelly. The remains were then conveyed to Marie United Church where service was conducted by the Minister, Reverend Wallace MacPherson. Mrs. Willard Spencer of Charlottetown sang, by request of the deceased, the hymn.
