Planning Fight Against Diseases

A thorough spring cleanup, to remove all possible sources of plant diseases, is one of the first practical measures to perform. By this means the spread of diseased plant material or debris which would otherwise permit the production and spread of disease germs or spores. This procedure, states R. R. Hurst, Dominion Laboratory of Plant Pathology, Charlottetown, P. E. I., is especially significant to those who realize that young and tender plants are highly susceptible to attack; for once spring growth begins the benefits of this important practice are greatly reduced. Thus the potato blight problem is attacked by first disposing of all blighted tubers which might later be used for seed, only to result in a poor stand or even an outbreak of this disease in the field. Blackleg, another tuber rotting disease, is very appreciably controlled by sanitation in the storage basement and further reduced by seed treatment. The question as to what important diseases should be considered when planning the season's campaign of preventive measures, will of course be decided very largely by the nature of the crops and their location throughout Canada, whether they be fruit, grains or vegetables. In all cases it would be strongly advisable to confer with the nearest plant pathologist, who is acquainted with, and can give advice on the most up-to-date control measures against plant diseases.

In the case of fruit diseases timely spraying is of great importance, but first it is necessary to obtain and study a copy of the approved spraying schedule for your particular district. By adhering to its recommendations and by properly timing spray applications the results should be satisfactory. The fruit trees should be pruned before spraying is begun. Then there is a matter of reconditioning the spray outfit to ensure quick and thorough work, replacing the pump, attaching a new hose, or replacing defective nozzles, etc. Such matters as these go far towards the effectiveness of the campaign against late blight (potatoes); not forgetting the importance of putting on protective clothing, according to the schedule accepted for your crop. The time is now opportune to consider seed grain treatment as a treatment is recommended for protection against such seed-borne diseases as blotch of oats and blotch of barley. The loose straw of wheat and barley, however, require treatment by hot water employed in conjunction with the establishment of an isolated seed as a source of disease-free seed for the following year.
