PARISIAN WOMAN ACQUITTED OF HUSBAND'S MURDER.

PARIS, November 30.—Seine assizes yesterday acquitted of murder Mme. Suzanne Poekes, whose husband a Paris business man, was found dead in bed in his home here last June with five bullets in his body and one bullet in his head. The defense claimed that the woman loved her husband and that there was no motive for desiring his death.

In explaining the number of wounds in the body the woman said Poekes had attempted to commit suicide and had shot himself in the head and that the five shots in the body were fired accidentally while she was struggling to take the revolver away from Poekes.

Three days after the shooting and while in Seine Lazare prison, Mme. Poekes gave birth to a child.

A DYING CHILD.

The Czarevitch of Russia is expected soon in Egypt. Not to be welcomed and feasted in the realms of a thousand kings, but to be carried about in an attendant's arms, to take the sulphur baths, and to die. He is only 10 years old, this pretty Grand Duke of Alexis, but incurable tuberculosis is painfully devouring his bones. Only a few months and his gilded and sorrowful life will end.

What wistful figure this Imperial boy makes, even beside the great pyramid, the empty tomb of Cheops—even before the long, black cabinets where many a Rameses and Thotmes lie crumbling and black in ancient spices.

He is only a boy. Yet for his coronation a crown is prepared, double the lustre of the crown of Egypt. He is a prince, yet his Empress mother the dearly beloved Alice of Hesse, loves him, wants him and knows that he cannot live.
