 collaborationists. Instead, the French authorities seemed loath to dispose of him, apparently for fear of making him a martyr whose name would become a rallying cry for all dissident elements.

Should Colette conveniently be found insane, the authorities might let her out.

He insisted at an examination in prison that he was not a Communist, as had been alleged, but was a supporter of the Free French movement of General Charles De Gaulle. Laval and that meanwhile continued to improve in a Versailles hospital.

The Paris prosecutor couldn't even make up his mind as to whether to consign Colette to one of the new anti-Communist death courts.

One of these courts yesterday sentenced a woman school teacher to 10 years at hard labor for distributing Communist propaganda.

Including unres in Denmark, the lower house of the Danish Parliament cancelled legislative immunity of its three Communist members in order to legalize their imprisonment by the justice ministry. This dispatch, necessarily routed via Berlin, did not give details.

Another story coming through Berlin originated in Sofia, capital of Bulgaria, of Germany's little "partners." It told of proposed penalties in Parliament ranging from 10 years in prison to death for distribution of illegal literature, writing of slogans on walls, or dissemination of rumors.

Death was proposed for any Bulgarian speaking over "enemy" radio stations.

Yankees are Practically in Playdale and Jane Azoff win At Shediac

NEW YORK, Sept. 3.—(AP)—The resourceful New York Yankees squeaked out a 2-1 11-inning triumph over the Red Sox at Boston today to assure themselves at least a tie for the American League pennant.

It was a tremendous struggle, with both Ernie Bonham and Broadway Charley Wagner pitching shutout ball for six innings, but the Yanks finally came through to get within one victory of their fifth championship in six years.

They have won 90 games and lost 45. If they lose all of the 19 they still have to play 14 more to add up to 64 defeats. Today's game forced the Red Sox into a tie with Chicago White Sox for second place, each with 70 victories and 64 defeats.

In the only other American League game of the day, the Senators mustered five runs in the ninth inning at Washington to defeat the Athletics 9-8 after Philadelphia had produced five runs with two out in the eighth inning.

Defending Champ Don McNeil Advances To Semi-finals; Will Meet Kovacs Friday

NEW YORK, Sept. 3.—(AP)—Defending champion Don McNeill of Oklahoma City looked like anything but a has-been today as he knocked a determined Wayne Sabin out of the United States Tennis Championships at Forest Hills by scores of 6-3, 7-5, 3-6, 6-3.

McNeill appeared today to have regained completely the blazing forecourt game that carried him to victory a year ago. McNeill, up to the championships, had been playing indifferent tennis for a top-notch, getting knocked off in one meet after another until when it came time to seed the players for the big show itself, the tournament committee was forced to drop him to third place, behind both Bobby Riggs and Frank Kovacs.

The triumph brought McNeill through to the semi-finals in which he will encounter Kovacs Friday. Kovacs, the Oakland stylist, was never extended in eliminating young John Kramer of Monrovia, Calif., 6-4, 7-5, 7-5, despite the apparently close score.

In the other men's quarter-finals tomorrow, Bobby Riggs will face Frankie Parker and Bryan Grant, Jr., will attempt to score his third straight upset at the expense of Ted Schroeder, seeded No. 4.

Pauline Betz of Los Angeles and Margaret Osborne of San Francisco accompanied each other into the semi-finals of the women's championships, Miss Betz defeating Barbara Kruse of San Francisco, 6-2, 6-2, and Miss Osborne scoring a surprisingly one-sided victory over Helen Bernhard of New York City, 6-3, 6-1.

In tomorrow's upper bracket women's quarter-finals, Mrs. Sarah Paley Cooke plays Hope Knowles of Philadelphia, and Helen Jacobs of Greenville, Del., faces Dorothy Bundy of Santa Monica.

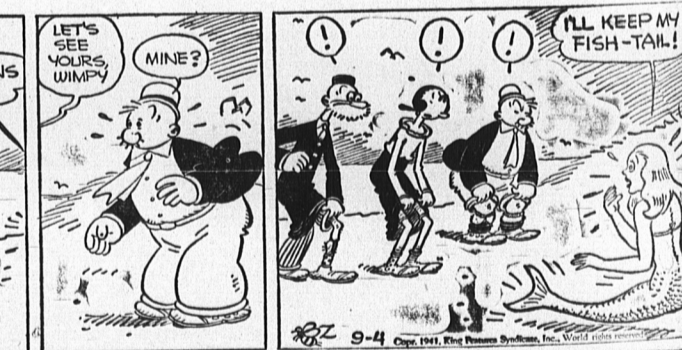
