**Teachers' Convention**

The Local Teachers' Convention was held in the Orange Hall in Uigg on September 5th, 1941. There were present about seventy teachers in the absence of the President, Samuel Lowe, the Vice-President, Stuart MacDonald, president. The following committees were appointed for the Convention. Nominations, Mrs. Cassie Reynolds, Kathryn Fraser, Louis Herring. Resolutions, Doris MacPherson, Kathryn MacLeod, Marion MacQuarrie. Press, Pearl Finley, Margaret Rley, Question Box, Miss Agnew, Lorne Stewart. The minutes of the last meeting were read by the Secretary Doris Rooney. The adoption of the minutes was followed by remarks by the chairman. The first speaker of the morning was Supervisor Woolner who used as his topic "The future of the free marches forward on the feet of little children." He pointed out that education should not only be the accumulation of book know-

ledge but teaching children to be good citizens. He stated that teachers should not be examination conscious and should not think one grade more important than another. Miss Verna Darrach reported that the Junior Red Cross during last year had done the best work since its organization. She showed the teachers afghans and quilts made by pupils and one of the boxes which the Red Cross is packing for British prisoners of war. As Springfield School won first place in Junior Red Cross work for the third successive year, the banner they had received was read and a book on the "History of the Red Cross" was presented to the teacher, Gayda Reeves. The Montague "Silver Stars" having won second place, the new banner was presented to their teacher, Elsie MacGregor. Miss Jacqueline MacDonald, Secretary of the Teachers' Federation, explained the need for all the teachers to belong to the Federation and stated that the membership fee is small in comparison with the work being done to help the teachers.

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**DOMINION-PROVINCIAL YOUTH TRAINING**

Under the Provision of a grant for unemployed young people, arrangements have been completed for training courses as outlined below. Students making application for attendance at these courses must be in unemployed circumstances though not necessarily on relief and be from sixteen to thirty years of age. Applicants in necessitous circumstances will be given preference. Applicants must be in good health and of good character. Transportation, tuition, board and lodging will be provided free to those attending.

Applications for those courses will be received up to but NOT LATER THAN OCTOBER 1st. When applications are received, a form will be mailed to each applicant and this form must be completely filled out and returned to the Department of Agriculture. Selection of students will be made strictly in accordance with the provisions of the Youth Training Agreement by a special committee appointed for that purpose. Notification of the acceptance of any student approved by the committee will be forwarded in due course. Above dates of opening are subject to change. For further information, apply to W. R. The questionnaire was read by the Vice-President and answered by teachers and supervisors. It was decided that the foremost aim in teaching was to train pupils to become good citizens. At this point the meeting adjourned. In the hall an excellent dinner was served to the teachers by the ladies of the Women's Institute of Uigg. The afternoon session was opened by a sing-song which was conducted by Miss Jacqueline MacDonald assisted by Miss Anna MacDonald at the organ.

Other questions on the questionnaire were then discussed. Mr. Reginald MacDonald explained clearly how a larger administrative unit system would benefit teachers. Supervisor Hynes pointed out the requirements of a well-equipped classroom and Allan Martin gave an illustration on an approved method of saluting the flag. Mr. Chandler of the P. E. Island Libraries in pointing out the value of books to children stated that, if a child had been taught to read, he could educate himself. Mr. William McPhee of the staff of Prince of Wales explained the new Teacher Training Course. Prof. Blanchard, Vice-Principal of Prince of Wales College reminded the teachers of their duty in training the minds of the future generation.

The written questions passed in by the teachers were read by Miss Agnew and answered by the supervisors. The following resolutions were brought in by the Committee: Be it resolved: 1. That the teachers strive to maintain the high standard already gained in Red Cross work and try to put even greater effort in that work this year. 2. That persons who have qualified for teachers and are not yet eighteen years of age receive payment for their service. 3. That teachers be paid according to their license regardless of the number of pupils in the district and that no deduction be made from salaries for deficiency in attendance. 4. That the P. E. I. Teachers' Federation continue its efforts for higher salaries. 5. That Study Groups be continued. 6. That thanks be extended to the various speakers who contributed to to-day's program and to all who in any way helped to make the Convention a success. That thanks be extended to the members of Uigg Women's Institute for the delicious dinner which was served and to the ladies who sent flowers to decorate the Orange Hall. 8. That thanks be extended to the Trustees of the Orange Hall for the use of the building. The following are the officers for the coming year. President—Stuart MacDonald. Vice president—Louise Hewitt. Secretary—Anna MacDonald. The Convention was closed by the singing of the National Anthem.
