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DISORDERS MAR ROYAL VISIT TO BELFAST

URGES REDRAFTING OF FREIGHT RATES ACT

SEES ACT AS MAGNA CHARTA OF MARITIMES

Warning Sounded By Trade Board President At Outing Yesterday.

(By The Canadian Press) BADDECK, N. S., July 28—Redrafting of the Maritime Freight Rates Act was urged by Stephen G. Mooney, Andover, N.B., president of the Maritime Board of Trade as he addressed Sydney Board of Trade members at their annual outing in Victoria County's shire town today.

"The time has come to re-draft this Act, to set the best brains of the Maritimes together working with the common and only object of advancing the interests of our Maritime Provinces, remodelling this Act and making it the Magna Charta of the Maritimes which it was supposed to have been", he said.

The speaker outlined the origin of the act and "potato case" in which an appeal for preferential rates on potatoes moved westward by the Maritime Provinces was disallowed by the Supreme Court of Canada.

"The decision followed the literal workings of the act and not that its sponsor (Sir Andrew Rae Duncan) intended it should read."

SIX DIE IN RIOTING AT BARBADOS

BRIDGETOWN, Barbados, July 28—Police and British Marines stayed on watch tonight, fearful of further outbreaks of rioting which already has claimed a known toll of six dead and 21 injured.

For 36 hours between Monday night and early this morning, a disorderly mob of laborers and other Bridgetown citizens had marched about, damaging property and creating disturbances.

The British cruiser Apollo arrived today and sent marines ashore to assist police in quelling the demonstrators, and, except for one flare-up during today, the rioters apparently were becoming less violent.

QUIET, BUT TENSE

Police said the atmosphere had become "quiet but tense" after the arrival of the marines.

Before police officers read the Riot Act to an unruly mob on Bridgetown's main street yesterday and then ordered a volley to be fired at the rioters, hundreds of citizens, said to be chiefly negroes, had marched about Bridgetown protesting the expulsion of the Trinidadians.

Shop windows were smashed, automobiles were wrecked or rolled into the sea, and buses were dismantled. Traffic and transportation were disrupted for hours in the city.

15 Killed In Crash Of Crack Airliner

There were 10 passengers and five in the crew. One of the passengers was killed as a Mexican named Trillo. Three were listed as Americans.

OFFICER DISARMED

Even as they sailed homeward to the strains of "Come Back to Erin" another disorder occurred west of Belfast. A police constable patrolling at Dunville Park was surrounded by a gang of about 40 men, several of whom drew guns, disarmed the officer and then fled.

SIGHTED 600 ICEBERGS

WOODS HOLE, Mass., July 28—Thomas Nolan, chief boatswain of the coast guard patrol boat General Greene, today reported that during his four month's spring patrol of northern steamer lanes the vessel sighted 600 icebergs compared with 100 seen a year ago.

Windows Shattered

The warehouse was little damaged but every window in a four-story factory on the opposite side of the street was shattered. A hole was torn in two shop fronts 50 yards away.

Customs Houses Burned

Along the Free State border Irish hoodlums ran amok. Twenty-eight Free State and Ulster customs huts were burned along the boundary line from Carlingford to the sea.

Blast Near Route Of Royal Parade Caused By Mine

Series Of Acts Of Violence By Extremist Irish Republicans Linked With Coronation Visit.

(By The Canadian Press) BELFAST, Northern Ireland, July 28—Police announced tonight a deliberately planted mine caused today's violent explosion here during the Royal parade marking the Coronation visit of the King and Queen to Ulster.

The explosion shook a wide area of Belfast, only a half mile from the parade route followed by Their Majesties. Police said they also had discovered a plot to wreck trains carrying police and other visitors to Belfast on their return to the Londonderry area. A mine was discovered beneath the railway line at Temple Patrick in Antrim County.

The explosion within Belfast was one of a series of acts of violence during the day, attributed by police to Extremist Irish Republicans.

Feeling ran high in Belfast tonight and police purposefully withheld announcement of the mine plant until after departure of the King and Queen aboard the Royal Yacht Victoria and Albert.
