THE many friends in Charlottetown of Patrick Sherry, formerly a resident of this city, will regret to learn of his sudden death in Seattle, Wash., on Jan. 12, 1905, at the age of 73. Mr. Sherry when quite a young man went to the Pacific Coast where he was very successful in business. After a time with his wife and son he returned to the island and for 23 years resided in Charlottetown. In 1891 the family removed to Seattle, Wash., where deceased passed away.

FOR many days past lobster fishing has been very much reduced by unfavorable weather. There has been no ice on the coast to speak of, and the harbors are all open, but the frequent high winds are the chief hindrance to fishing. Prices are awfully up for factory delivery and for shipment, but receipts are slow and unsteady. General report does not indicate scarcity of fish, and some grounds are more promising than ever, but a fair trial on them has seldom been made this month.—N. S. Coast Guard.

A SHORT time ago Mrs. Coyle of King Street, was sent to jail to serve sentence for breach of the Prohibition Act. At the time of her departure to a more spacious residence she left in the house provision in the form of three quarters of beef, a pig, a sheep, both of which were of course dead, and a barrel of flour besides some money. The house has during her absence had a large number of visitors and the police report that now almost all the large winter supply has been consumed.

A YOUNG man named Daniel McCormack, aged 20, hired with John T. Poole, Woodville Mills, Lower Cardigan, while going from that place to his home in Grand River Road, lost his way and was found Sunday morning in a snow bank about a mile and a half from Cardigan after being out all night. His face and hands and his legs to the knees were badly frozen and in his wandering he had gone into an open creek near where he was found. Unfortunately when thawing out the frozen limbs hot water was used instead of snow and cold and this has made his condition very serious.

A recent Portland, Ore. dispatch says regarding "Jim" McDonald whose revelation of himself in that city to his friend has been the subject of many newspaper stories recently: Good news reached McDonald this morning, when he was informed through a despatch in the morning paper that his brother, Sir William Macdonald, many times a millionaire in Montreal, will visit him and will probably share with him in his old age some of the vast fortune he has accumulated. The old bill collector has a long history. He fought Indians here in the early days and took up much valuable land, but lost it. McDonald for years would stand in front of houses ringing a bell to annoy the inmates and cause them to pay what they owed or had been left him to collect. The police stopped that method. He now camps in front of houses, displaying the following sign, in large letters: Moody said: "If you want to get into heaven you must pay your bills. Pay now!"
