Mayor Promises Probe Of S'ide Fire Department

A promise that a thorough investigation will be conducted into the affairs of the Fire Department with particular reference to the recent fire which destroyed St. Paul's Church was made last evening by Mayor J. P. Arnett at a weekly meeting of the Summerside Town Council.

Councillor W. E. Smallman and D. P. McNeil were absent from the meeting.

The Fire Department matter was brought up by Councillor R. L. Mollison who said that he had heard of a complaint in connection with the handling of the St. Paul's fire. There are rumors that the fire department had not done its job and he also heard that the pumper would not work. "Is any investigation being made?" he asked.

He said he felt that the firemen were not so much at fault as some people are inclined to believe something should be done.

Mayor Arnett said he knew there was criticism and he felt there was possibly some slight room for it. It is his intention, he said, to thoroughly investigate the matter and if necessary to call a meeting of the citizens. With reference to the pumper, he said that the Town Hall which indicates the water pressure is affected by the pumper, he said that the pumper had happened to come on and look at it at such a time, the pressure might appear to be low. "But as the firemen are concerned," he continued, "they have never asked for anything during the past year that they did not receive and a pumper was never mentioned during the year. It is found necessary to purchase a pumper, I believe the Town should do it."

Mayor Arnett congratulated the newly elected councillors and expressed his appreciation of their having been elected by acclamation.

Construction Permits Again

The matter of the proposed construction of a garage and filling station on the Army Road was again before the Council. The Clerk reported that Mr. Ingham Palmer which had been read at a previous meeting stating that legal action had been taken to prevent the building of the garage. The Council then passed a resolution that the building of the garage should be allowed to proceed to the extent that a cheque was enclosed and a construction permit requested. The Clerk then read a written opinion of the recorder Mr. E. H. Sprong, K.C., which was valid and the matter was within the power of the Council.

Mayor Arnett stated that a letter had been received from Mr. W. E. Darby, K.C., counsel for the Army Road Garage, stating his opinion that the building of the garage was not in violation of the law and therefore the Council had asked for a ruling from the recorder.

The following motion was then moved by Councillor T. D. Morrison, seconded by Councillor J. I. Gerrill and passed unanimously.

"In the matter of the application for a building permit for the garage on the Army Road, the Council and Mr. Murphy Motors Ltd. and Mr. Charles McNeil, which has been read at a previous meeting, the Council has given its written opinion to the Council that under the act of incorporation of the Town of Summerside the Council possessed the authority to issue a building permit and zoning by-law.

Be it resolved that as the intended building is in violation of the zoning by-law, a building permit be issued and that the applicants be notified accordingly.

Other Resolutions

The following resolutions were passed on motion of Councillor Mollison, seconded by Councillor Gerrill.

Resolved that T. E. Hickey C.A. be appointed auditor for the Town of Summerside for the coming year at a salary of \$500.00.

Resolved that the Prince County Council be granted the sum of \$500.00 for the year 1946.

Councillor Gerrill informed the Council that the engineer is working on the plan for the new street with the object of converting the parking garage. It is also proposed to remove the utility poles and other things that mar the appearance of the street. He stated that he would be glad to receive suggestions from the Board of Trade and interested citizens.

It is the intention of the Council to have a meeting on the subject of the street lighting. Councillor Morrison thanked the citizens of the East Ward for their splendid support. The only complaint of his department was the condition of the street lighting he said and he would undertake to

Councillor Wedge also expressed appreciation at his re-election. He referred to the fact that Queen's Wharf had been partially repaired before the outbreak of war and as the fishermen all use this wharf for mooring their boats he felt that the work should be resumed as soon as possible. He also said that he believed that septic tanks for sewage disposal should be installed as soon as possible. Think Antiques Have Real Place in Modern Home

NEW YORK, Feb. 9 (CP) - Because of the tremendous interest in antiques today, decorators and collectors have been discussing the part that antiques will play in the post-war home that is flat-roofed, modern and efficient.

Designer Beryl S. Austrian insists that there is a place for antiques in modern interiors.

"I believe antiques are used sparingly in modern settings," she believes.

She believes a pair of fine bergere or a baroque settee can be used and absorbed into a modern part of it. She does feel, however, that drossy antiques, dull damask and droopy needlepoint can't enhance any room.

Important thing to remember in combining modern and antique furniture is to blend the two. It is not a matter of Empire and Baroque providing you balance it properly.

But if the dark old woods are stripped or bleached or pickled to blend with the modern, the antiques are used in modern decoration.

Antique accessories, as well as furniture, can point up a modern interior, she says. Lustre can help dramatize a modern setting. But a room that is stripped of ornamental detail must be carefully planned if a mixture of period furniture is going to be set against an interior of glass, metal and plastic.

Mrs. Austrian says that though there will be a great deal of new furniture, few people realize that there are always been some combinations of old and new in the average household.

Overstuffed, upholstered couches and chairs with spring seats were used in most households no matter what the period of the furnishings she says.
