BLANK forms for signatures are being circulated throughout the Province for the signatures of farmers for the purpose of establishing a factory for the manufacture of beet sugar. The farmers are asked to stipulate the number of acres which they are willing to devote to the raising of beets. The company furnish the seed at a cost of about \$2 an acre, and will give \$1 per ton for the beets.

THERE is no truth whatever in the statement that the Associated Board of the Royal Academy of Music and Royal College of Music had withdrawn its examinations from Canada and returned the fees of candidates who applied this year. Professor Stewart Macpherson, this year's examiner, was taken ill in Montreal and was unable to examine more than the Ontario and Montreal candidates. The Board cabled offering to send another examiner but, as he could not arrive in Canada before the midsummer holidays, when the candidates would be away, it was decided to cancel the remaining examinations and return the fees. There are an increasing number in Canada who wish to obtain the Associated Board's certificates and there is no thought whatever of suspending the examinations which have been so successful in England, Africa and Australia. The syllabus for the 1901 Canadian examinations is now being printed and will be ready shortly.
