Foreigners Are Returning to Europe

OTTAWA, Jan. 23.—Reports received by the Labor Department from ocean steamship companies indicate that the exodus of foreign unskilled labor from Canada is now unprecedentedly large. Austrians, Italians, Greeks and other Canadian immigrants of European extraction are going back by the thousands to visit their old homes and see their families, or what is left of them after the devastation of war during the past four years.

War conditions prevented practically all transatlantic travel except for soldiers or those engaged in war business. Meanwhile the foreign unskilled laborers in Canada got high wages and saved up considerable for the day when they could go back again to their home land and bring help to their kith and kin.

It is estimated that over fifty thousand of them have left Canada for Europe since hostilities ceased. This exodus is of course, helping to solve the labor problem in Canada, following the closing of munition employment. The return tide will, it is expected, not set in until next year as most of the men now going over have enough savings to keep them in Europe for a year or so.

Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

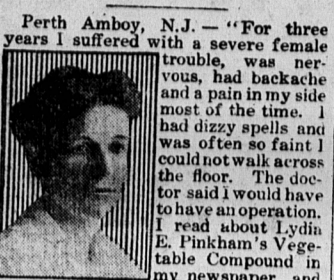
THE sole head of a family or any male over eighteen years of age, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. TRIBUTE TO CHAPLAIN

Assistant Director of the Service Praises Work of Captain Steele. Lieut-Colonel A. H. McGreer, Assistant Director of Chaplain Services, Canadian Corps, France, writing to the work of Captain Steele, says: "For more than six months the Captain carried on a most valuable and aggressive social and religious work amongst Canadian troops at the Infantry Base Depot at Havre. The Officer Commanding the depot has spoken of him as a most faithful friend and servant to the soldiers, whose work they will not soon forget. "Since coming to the Corps in June, 1917, he has been closely associated with myself, and at all times has been keen, and resourceful, and courageous in carrying out his duties. During all the fighting he has followed closely behind the advancing troops, and at a great personal risk, carried on his beneficent work—namely that of opening and operating coffee stalls along the roads leading to the front line, and it was due in large measure to his splendid efforts that we were able to supply the thousands of muddied, wounded, and war-weary soldiers with comforts which did so much to help them withstand the hardships and sufferings of the battle. "He has frequently taken charge of services for us and his forceful addresses have never failed to move and help the men, and his influence at all times has been strong and edifying."
