FROM SALISBURY

The following letter has been received from Sergt. Everett Robertson of Pownal by his cousin Miss Daphne MacDonald, Peters Road, and will be of interest to all.

Can. Exp. Force. E. Coy 12 Battalion, Bulford Camp, Eng. Dec. 2nd, 1914.

Dear Cousin:—Just a line to let you know that I received your letter today. Was pleased to hear from you. We are having very wet weather here at present although not very cold. Mostly all the Exp. Forces are stationed near here. We have some grand receptions since we landed, being reviewed by King George and Queen Mary, also by our Late Field Marshall Lord Roberts, also by Kitchener and other Great Generals.

We do a considerable lot of training such as field maneuvers and route marches. Sometimes we go twelve and fifteen miles in heavy marching order, also night attacks, so you see we are kept busy.

We're not sure when we will cross to France it will be some time after Xmas. The Germans are a hard nation to beat but we hope and trust that peace may come soon.

Since I landed here I have been on pass, Louis and I went to London. Its some City. We were all through the famous Westminster Abbey. It is a wonderful building and is used for historic events. We then saw the King's Palace and all the Grand monuments such as Lord Nelson's Wellington and Queen Victoria. They are beautiful. We all went to St. Pauls Cathedral the second largest church in the world. It is a fine piece of art. In here where Nelson, Wellington and Lord Roberts are buried the Dome alone is over 400 feet above land level. We then visited the British Museum. I cannot begin to tell you what we saw here. The most important I think was the Magna Charter which was signed by King John in 1215, also Shakespeares work. We were only in a short while. It would take one a week to see all in it and then only get a glimpse. We also saw the Tower of London where all the King's and Statemen were beheaded in ancient times. The Parliament Buildings too are magnificent both in splendor and size.

Many things came to my memory as I walked through those ancient buildings.

We hope and trust that we will be spared to come back and then we will be able to explain more fully our experience while in the Old Country.

We had a beautiful trip coming over being very calm and mild.

Well I must close trusting to hear from you soon. I remain your Cousin, EVERETT.

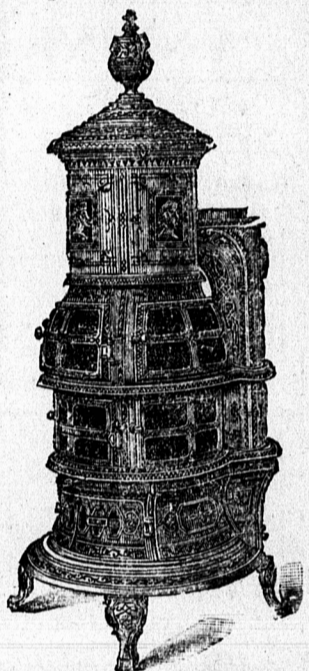
