## Allison Defeats Wood In Straight Sets To Capture U.S. Tennis Championship

**FOREST HILLS, N. Y., Sept. 12**—Walter Allison, the 31-year-old Austin, Tex., veteran who just about a month ago was on the verge of retiring as a singles player after a dismal European campaign, won the United States tennis championship today.  
 An unsuccessful finalist a year ago, Allison smothered Sidney B. Wood Jr., of New York in straight sets, 6-2, 6-2, 6-3, in a match that was contrastingly dull from a competitive standpoint in comparison with brilliant semi-final triumph yesterday over defending champion Fred J. Perry of England.  
 It was the most lopsided final in the 14 years since big Bill Tilden vanquished Wallace F. Johnson in the 1921 final with the loss of only five games—two less than Allison's margin of victory. Allison wasn't Allison's fault. Allison played as a man possessed, though there never was a time during the 50 minutes the contest lasted that he had to rise to the heights that carried him to victory over Perry.  
 Allison kept just enough pressure turned on to force Wood into repeated errors. Wood's reputation to have one of the most gifted raquets in the game, but at the same time it can also be dismayingly erratic. Except for a couple of spells Wood was far below par. When he missed, it was by feet and sometimes yards. Allison's margin of errors was inches.  
 Although the betting odds favored Allison at 6-5, Wood's showing was so disappointingly weak that it probably will cost him a place on next year's Davis Cup team. His progress through the tournament was spotty.

## Cards Win Opening Game Of Crucial Series From Giants; Tigers Strengthen Lead

**NEW YORK, Sept. 12**—Dizzy Dean reached out his long right arm today and snatched away New York Giants' hopes of capturing the National League lead by sweeping their important four-game series with the Cardinals. He also grabbed a good share of their hopes of taking the pennant as he pitched St. Louis to a 5-2 triumph in the opening game of the "crucial" struggle at St. Louis.  
 The victory enabled the Cards to stay a game in front of the best stepping Chicago Cubs and boosted their margin over the third place Giants to 4 1/2 games. It was the elder Dean's 26th huriling victory of the year.  
 While Dizzy turned in a superb performance on a share of their hopes made short work of Carl Hubbell, giant southpaw star, pounding him for four runs and seven of their nine hits in his five inning turn on the mound. The fifth tally was scored off Allyn Stout in the eighth after Harry Gumbert, youthful right hander just up from Baltimore, had pitched perfect ball through the sixth and seventh frames.

## Baer Promises Plenty If Louis Can Take It

**SPECLATOR, N. Y., Sept. 12**—Max Baer served official notice on Joe Louis today that unless the Brown Bomber can take it—and in great quantities—he won't answer the bell for the second round against the reformed Californian hot spotter at the Yankee Stadium Sept. 24.  
 "I'm telling you and I'm telling him just what I am going to do," declared Max after today's workout. "I'm going to wrap it all up in one package and let him have it in the first round. That will either spill him or leave him so groggy I'll polish him off in the second. If he gets up, I'll knock him out. I can take the most punishment. I've proved I can absorb my share; Louis hasn't. And if he can take what I'm going to throw at him and stay on his feet, he'll have to have a cast iron chin."  
 A lean, tan and well trained Baer stepped through six rounds this afternoon against Willie McGee, a burly negro and Tony Canzola, a heavyweight favorites for the man who can take the most punishment. Max took all they had, grinned and came back for more. Seemingly, he deliberately let both his playmates out with the best licks in their repertoires. After he had demonstrated conclusively that he belongs to the body and good old-fashioned clouts to the chin and did not give him, he stepped in and gave both boys workmanlike going overs.  
 Baer's hands are strong, hardened by much wood chopping far back in the Adirondack forests.

## TIGERS DEFEAT YANKS

**NEW YORK, Sept. 12**—(A.P.)—Detroit Tigers sank their claws into New York Yankees today and climbed over them to a still higher place in the American League pennant race as they won the opening game of what may be the deciding series, 4-3, at Yankee Stadium.  
 Trailing for seven innings, the Tigers put on one of their characteristic finishes to score six runs in the last two frames as home runs and triples bounced off their bats and four pitchers failed to check the assault. The victory gave them an 8 1/2 game lead.  
 Breaking out of their losing streak, the Athletics swept both games of a doubleheader at Philadelphia with Chicago White Sox. They won the first game 11-2, and the second 4-3 after the Sox had tied the score with a two-run rally in the ninth.  
 Fox hit two home runs, running his season's total to 33, and Higgins one in the first game.  
 Earl Whitehill, veteran Washington side-wheeler, turned in his best pitching performance of the year at Washington as he held Cleveland Indians to three hits and the Senators won 3-0.  
 The Senators scored in the fourth when Bolton doubled and tallied on Kuhl's fly. Travel singled and scored Powell's single in the fifth and Estellella doubled and came home on a fly by Kress in the seventh.

## CUBS BRILLIANT

The Cubs kept up their brilliant battle to capture the National League pennant when they slammed Brooklyn Dodgers into submission 13-3 at Chicago for their 17th in the last 21 starts.  
 While his mates battered three Brooklyn pitchers for 15 hits, Lon Warneke limited the Dodgers to eight blows for his 18th victory of the season. Auggie Galan topped the Chicago clouters with his 11th home run, a double and a single in five times up.  
 The Pirates began experimenting for a possible 1935 lineup and anchored Philadelphia Phils 11-0, at Pittsburgh, behind the neat pitching of big Jim Weaver.  
 Twenty-year old "Cookie" Lavagetto subbing at third for manager Pat Taylor, who is not expected to be a regular next year, cracked out three hits, including a triple, and scored three runs.  
 Gene Schott scored his ninth victory of his first major league season as the Reds defeated Boston Braves 4-2, at Cincinnati. It was Boston's 13th straight defeat.  
 Well supported afield, Schott granted only six hits, two of them in the first inning to give a Boston run, and two more in the ninth to yield another tally.

## Calumet Budlong Captures Fredericton Free-for-all

**FREDERICTON, N. B., Sept. 12**—Calumet Budlong, owned by Mrs. Margaret Ballard, North Sydney, N. S., upset the dope today by winning all three heats of the Free-for-All event on the concluding program of harness racing at the Fredericton Exhibition.  
 Lady Locket, from Bangor, Me., took the 2:15 Trot and Pace, and the 2:14 Trot went to Plucky Pluto, Presque Isle, Me.  
 Making his first start in Canada, Calumet Budlong was in one of the largest fields ever to face a starter for a Free-for-All on a Maritime track. Five of the six horses finished so close in the first heat that the judges had difficulty placing them. H. M. Sweeney's Toll Gate from Bridgewater, N. S., and Dermot, of Charlottetown, had been first and second favorites, respectively. Pulling up lame after finishing fourth in the first heat and third in the second, Toll Gate was drawn.

## U. S. Senior Golfers Defeat Canadians

**RYE, N. Y., Sept. 12**—A spy band of United States senior golfers gave 15 Canadian veterans a bad trimming in the annual Duke of Devonshire trophy match here today. The final team tally was 30 to 2, the lonely points on Canada's side resulting from a sparkling round by the venerable George S. Lyon of Toronto.  
 The patriarch of Canadian put-ter-dom needed a stroke for each of his years—77—to four the course and take the two points on the Nassau system by downing Frederick S. Snaar, the United States captain. Otherwise, the Dominion team members were unable to score, although two of the matches ended in draws.  
 Canada's former senior champion R. M. Gray, finished even with Christopher Deibel. Mr. Gray's first score 39 was enough to wipe out a four hole deficit on the first nine. S. L. McKay accounted for the other draw, against W. H. Conroy of the United States side.  
 It was the 15th American triumph in the competition of the grey-beards. Canada won in 1918, her only victory. Two years had produced stalemates.

## Little And Emery Title Favorites

**CLEVELAND, Sept. 12**—Stealing some of the champion's sub-par thunder, Oklahoma's Walter Emery skyrocketed today toward a collision with the California comet of golf, William Lawson Little Jr., with as glittering a scoring streak as the United States amateur championship has ever seen.  
 They are still a full 36 holes and two big hurdles apart, in opposite halves of the tournament draw, but they dominated the search into the semi-finals today and they are the choice of the rail birds to fight it out in the title round Saturday over the Country Club course.  
 Tomorrow Emery, 23-year-old University of Oklahoma law student and former intercollegiate champion, faces another newcomer to amateur heights, 24-year-old Joe Lynch of Boston, this year's Georgetown Golf Champion. Little in the lower half comes to grips with an old rival, Omaha's resourceful Johnny Goodman, former United States open king.  
 Jack Nash of London, Ont., the last of the Canadian quarter that started out hopefully last Monday, fell during the day. Unsteady driving and jittery putting wiped out an early burst of brilliance and Fred Haas Jr., of New Orleans, took Nash's measure by 4 and 3.  
 While Little was bowling over two more opponents with characteristic powerhouse tactics today, making it an aggregate string of 25 victories in succession in two years of national amateur title play, Emery kept the attention of the galleries by his dazzling shots.

## Yarmouth Captures N.S. Baseball Title

**YARMOUTH, N. S., Sept. 12**—The annual fight between Yarmouth Gateways and St. Stephen's Milltown Kiwanis for the Maritime baseball championship are becoming an institution in sports circles of Canada's Far East.  
 For the third successive year Yarmouth will challenge the New Brunswick squad for the crown. It has not since before even the Gateways entered the arena.  
 Gateways surged through competition in the Nova Scotia play-downs this year, defeating Dominion Hawks 9-4 today to win the provincial finals in three straight games. Throughout the entire play-down schedule, Yarmouth was not defeated.  
 Kelley Batted Out  
 With Smokey Joe Kelley, Cape Breton's greatest pitcher, on the mound, Hawks put the best team they had on the field today in a vain attempt to get back in the picture and alone for two defeats they received in their own park. Scores against them in the opening games were 14-0 and 6-2.  
 But Gateways knocked Smokey Joe out in the second inning after he had been touched for five hits that yielded seven runs. Disorganized and almost beaten before they started, Hawks were not in the sensational form they showed at the end of the last month when they went through several touch series to reach the Nova Scotia finals.  
 Veteran right-handed Eddie "Dizzy" Holmes of Montreal took over for Kelley in the second and held the Gateways in check the rest of the way as the champions coasted through on the momentum of their early lead.  
 Bain In Good Form  
 A steady pitcher, Nate Bain, took things easy on the Yarmouth mound. Two bad innings, the first and seventh gave Hawks their three runs.  
 Halley Horton, all-round Yarmouth athlete born in the year of the comet he is named after, showed how it was done today. He had four hits in five trips to the plate, one a long double over left field. His brother Doug had a triple and a double in four times at bat.
