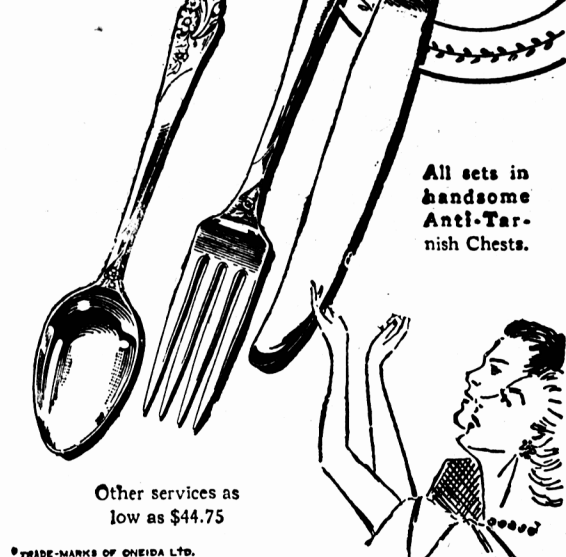

Urges Continuation Of Rental Controls

OTTAWA, Sept. 16 — (CP) — The Canadian Legion has urged the federal government to maintain current rental controls until March, 1951, and launch bold action to alleviate Canada's critical housing shortage.

The Legion's brief on housing, presented to Reconstruction Minister Winters Monday, was made public today. Lt.-Col. L.D.M. Baxter of Winnipeg, Dominion president of the Legion who appeared before Mr. Winters, said in an interview he received a kindly audience and a promise that the brief would be given consideration.

Col. Baxter said that when the Legion asked for retention of rental controls, it meant all the various kinds of controls the government has on rents and housing.

Controls now are scheduled to expire next March 31. Most urgently needed was development of low-rental housing, the brief said. The Legion called on the federal government to pass legislation which will enable the provinces and municipalities to get together on a "bold program of low rental housing for Canadians of low income."

The brief suggested that the housing plan be developed along these lines:

1. Financing to be done by the Federal Government at a low rate of interest.
2. Responsibility for the Federal government loans to be taken by the provincial governments. The provinces also will survey low-rental needs and help form local housing authorities.
3. Municipalities to see that local housing authorities are established and then assume full responsibility for the administration and allocation of houses built with low incomes get preference.

Unless steps are taken by the Federal Government, the Legion maintained, housing conditions will become more acute next year. At present veterans and civilians were living in "cramped, crowded quarters."
