WAR EMERGENCY TRAINING

Arrangements have been made to provide training for war industries in Nova Scotia and New Brunswick centres for a number of trainees from Prince Edward Island. Training will be given in these courses in Sheet metal work, Welding, Machine Shop operation, and fitting for ground mechanics in the R. C. A. F. also in Wireless operation, Aero engine fitting and Air Frame Mechanics. Young men between the ages of 18 and 30 years with Grade 8 education and physically fit will be eligible. Transportation costs, tuition and a living allowance will be supplied. Required forms to make application for these courses may be secured on application from W. R. Shaw, Deputy Minister of Agriculture, Charlottetown, Prince Edward Island.

In Memoriam MR. WILLIAM HYDE Stricken suddenly ill early Saturday morning at his residence 14 Grafton Street, Halifax William Hyde, 30 employee of the Halifax Motors, died before medical assistance reached him. Shortly before 2 o'clock residents of the house requested employees for a nearby taxi office to call a doctor for the young man who had been taken suddenly ill.

After considerable difficulty the taxman said he succeeded in locating a doctor who was willing to answer the call, but when he arrived he found the young man dead. Police were notified and Dr. F. V. Woodbury, medical examiner, called.

He is survived by his uncle and aunt, Mr. and Mrs. George Kline, with whom he made his home. Mr. Hyde was born in Murray Harbor, Prince Edward Island, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Herman Hyde, but had lived here for some time. He was unmarried, and was a member of the Roman Catholic church.

The funeral took place from St. Mary's Mortuary chapel at 8.45 Monday morning, to St. Mary's Cathedral for 9 o'clock mass. Interment was in Mount Olivet cemetery. — Halifax Chronicle April 7.

JOHN W. BROWN On every hand were heard expressions of sorrow and sympathy when it was learned that John W. Brown, a hatter and respected citizen of Tyne Valley had passed to the Great Beyond.

Although in failing health for some time he was confined to bed only six days and the end came suddenly in the early hours of Thursday morning, March 29th, 1941.

The late Mr. Brown was born in Charlottetown, Prince Edward Island, on January 9th, 1858; son of the late Mr. and Mrs. James Brown Charlottetown. He was one of a family of nine children of whom the following survive: — Mrs. M. J. Brown, Charlottetown; Emmons Cameron, U.S.A.; and Annie, (Mrs. Richard Green) California.

Sixty two years ago on July 21st 1879 he married Sara L. Hopwood of North m. being blessed with a long and happy wedded life. Mr. and Mrs. Brown celebrated their 50th wedding anniversary at the home of their daughter Mrs. A. W. Milligan, Tyne Valley. After celebrating their sixtieth anniversary with their family at the home of their son George W. Wellesley Hills, U.S.A.; returned to Tyne Valley.

He was a keen, competent business man and for seventeen years conducted a mercantile establishment in Tyne Valley. He retired from business 33 years ago on account of his health, and since then has spent the greater part of his life in different parts of the U.S.A.
