CAPT. Robert Fraser, Superintendent of the Dominion Coal Co. Works at Kings-ton and Mrs. Fraser, who have been at Georgetown for some days, returned to the city Saturday and went to the Capes in the afternoon to cross en route to their home.

REV. JAMES M. HEARDON, Professor of Biology at St. Paul's University, who belongs to this city, has left St. Paul for his vacation, the first university term being just completed. He will go north as far as Winnipeg before the vacation is over where Rev. Father Crary, Grand Knight of Minneapolis and a corps of 300 knights will establish a new council of the Knights of Columbus. Father Reaction is himself Deputy Grand Knight at St. Paul.

THE Board of Trade, Montague, held their annual meeting Saturday evening which was well attended. Considerable business was discussed and a committee appointed to confer with the Steam Navigation Company as to freight rates. A. G. McDonald, H. Nelson and Murdoch McKinnon, Montague were appointed delegates to attend the Winter Service Meeting to be held in Charlottetown, Feb. 11. Officers elected for the ensuing year are, namely: W. L. Poole, Montague, President; Temple McDonald, Georgetown, Vice President; D. S. Enman, Secretary, re-elected.

THE Black Diamond line steamers Louisburg and Bonavista are "laid up" at Halifax for their annual overhauling. The Coban will lay up at St. John's, Nfld., in a few weeks time, and it is likely the Cape Breton and Cacouna will also be given an overhauling before the spring shipping season opens. D. G. McAlpine, marine superintendent of the Dominion Coal Co., is at present in Halifax overseeing the repairs to the Louisburg and Bonavista.

It is claimed that six hundred persons have been enrolled as church members in Truro since the commencement of Crossley and Hunter's evangelistic services a month ago. Messrs. Crossley and Hunter vigorously the statement that excessively large contributions have been made at the services here. This is so unusual in Truro that the denials are creating considerable comment. The evangelists say that the contributions have been so small that they will not profit above five or six dollars each per week.—Truro News.

A Picton despatch of Saturday says:—Fire was discovered in the Revere House at two o'clock this morning and made such progress that the stairs could not be used. The guests escaped through windows and were more or less injured. A servant girl, Mary McEachern, is missing. Nat Doherty, the proprietor, was badly injured. W. E. Whitman jumped from a window and received severe injuries. (Mr. Doherty is a brother of P. Doherty, formerly proprietor of the Hotel Davies and is well known in Charlottetown. Miss Strong of Summerside was among the guests but escaped unhurt.)

In conversation with The Guardian a well-known authority on winter conditions in the Straits expressed the opinion that there was a strong probability that the Stanley and Minto might be unable to make a trip in the Straits during the whole of February. His deductions were based on the fact that the Straits had filled with ice when the tides were at their highest point during last full moon and would require high tides again and strong southwest winds before the ice would be cleared from the Straits. During the present month there is a strong probability of continued strong southwest winds. Should the boats be tied up for the entire months there are very serious indications of a tie-up in business as well as a hay famine.

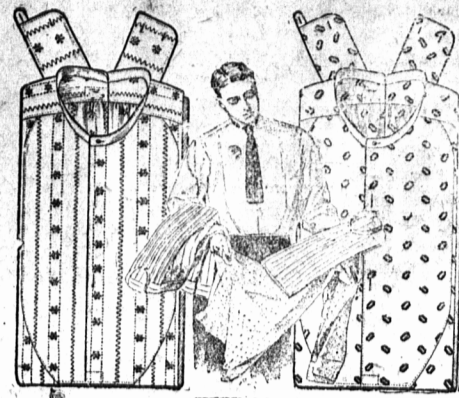
