He leaves to mourn two sons, Earl at Carleton Siding and Archie at home, his wife and a daughter having predeceased him.

His funeral service was held on Tuesday, June 22, a short service at the home followed by service at the North Tryon Presbyterian Church, conducted by his pastor, Rev. E. R. Woodside, assisted by Miss Mary McKenzie, Deaconess. The hymns sung were "The Lord is My Shepherd," "Forever With the Lord," and "The Sands of Time are Sinking."

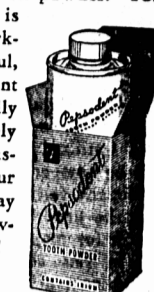

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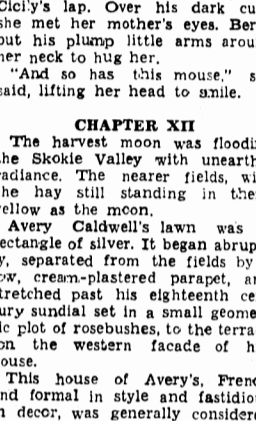
