An ambulance was at once sent for and the unfortunate man was removed to the Prince County Hospital. On examination it was found that he was very seriously injured, some ribs being broken and it was thought by the doctors that his skull was fractured. He is about 55 years of age, unmarried, and belongs to the western part of the province. His condition at a late hour last night was considered very critical.—C.

### BERLIN CLAIMS GREAT VICTORIES

(Special to The Guardian)

BERLIN, via London, Nov. 12.—Despatches received from the Bulgarian legation here report that the Bulgarian army, marching from Nish to Lakovac, captured an enormous quantity of military supplies of all kinds which the Serbians had abandoned. The demoralization of the Serbians, it is gathered from the advices, has evidently reached such a point that no longer to be expected.

A member of the legation called attention to the statements that a great number of rifles had been picked up along the line of march, as also were pieces of artillery and ammunition wagons, with harness cut and horses gone. He regarded it as improbable that any considerable body of troops would escape the Montenegrin or Albanian frontiers.

### BERLIN CLAIMS TO BE IN THE DARK

BERLIN, via London, Nov. 12.—The Ancona case as yet belongs to the category of submarine incidents, regarding which German naval circles have no report, except that which comes from hostile countries. Even the semi-official announcement made yesterday that the Ancona was sunk while trying to escape was derived from accounts sent out by the Havas and Stefani News Agencies. Nothing has been published here from the Austrian side, and it was stated at the admiralty, that, so far as known the German navy had received no report of the incident.

### Electrocuted By Contact With Live Wire

SYDNEY, Nov. 11.—John Boutillier, night stationary operator at the Cape Breton Electric Company's power house, was electrocuted by coming into contact with a live wire on an exposed part in the switchboard. Boutillier received a shock of 22,000 volts, stiffened out and fell. Medical aid was speedily procured and Dr. G. B. Lynch worked over the unfortunate man for a considerable time, but with no result. Death had been instantaneous.

### SERBIAN ARMY MAY BE CUT OFF

MILAN, via Paris, Nov. 12.—There is grave reason to fear that the main body of the Serbian army, which has been fighting the Germans and the Bulgarians' right wing, has been cut off between Kralivo and Nish, says despatches received here from the Seclos correspondent.

It is possible, the despatches say, that as the Southern Serbian army is holding at Katchanik, the retreating columns may escape the tentacles of the invaders, but it is considered significant that no news has been received from the retreating Serbian army for five days.

### BRITISH OCCUPY CITY OF BAGDAD

ROME, Nov. 12.—Commenting on the report that the British have occupied Bagdad, The Tribuna says: "Such an event is, perhaps, the most important of the present war. The occupation of Bagdad will certainly produce an enormous echo in the Moslem world, which considers this the moral capital of Mohammedanism, more than Constantinople or Mecca. The occupation of Bagdad may have serious consequences on the issue of the European war."

COPENHAGEN, Nov. 12.—(Via London)—A cannonade of terrific intensity was heard yesterday in the neighborhood of the Fehmarn Belt, in the Baltic Sea. It is believed by those who heard it to have been the result of a British submarine attack on the German squadron.

The firing lasted twenty minutes, and was of such violence that the windows and doors on the rocky harbor were blown open. Houses vibrated as though in an earthquake. The weather was so thick that it was impossible to observe any details of the engagement.
