WOMAN AND CHILD BURNED TO DEATH IN NEW YORK FIRE.

NEW YORK, March 1—Two persons were burned to death, several persons were injured and fifty families had a narrow escape in a fire which spread in mushroom fashion from the first floor to the roof of the five-story apartment house at the corner of Asterdam avenue and 129th street, within twenty minutes today.

The dead are a woman and a little girl.

The burned body of the child was found clasped in the woman's charred arms at the top of the fifth floor stairway, where escape had been cut off by smoke and flames. At a late hour they had not been identified.

NEW YORK, March 1—A robber who robbed the robbers who stole \$25,000 from two bank messengers in the financial district two weeks ago, was afterwards robbed twice himself.

Such was the chapter added to the "taxi-cab hold-up story" by the confession of Matteo Arbano today.

He gave himself up to the police today and told how he walked into a saloon where the five taxi-cab bandits were dividing the \$25,000 loot, and how by "pure bluff" he was given \$10,000. He was in turn held up by two companions and had to divide with them. With \$3,000 he still kept he fled to Havana, Cuba. In Havana he became acquainted with a woman and after a night of drinking, he said, he found himself short of \$2,500, which he alleged the woman had stolen.

SCIENCE HEALER TRIED IN NEW YORK

NEW YORK, March 1—The jury in the case of Willis Vernon Cole, a Christian Science practitioner, charged with practicing medicine without a license, was unable to agree on a verdict today and was discharged.

Expected to be a test case of the right of Christian Scientists to apply the tenets of their faith to the curing of disease for pay, the trial was marked by spirited arguments between counsel as to the validity of the Christian Scientists' belief.

Samuel Untermyer, Cole's counsel, who argued that his client was only practicing his church's tenets when he healed, offered to prove by fifty or more witnesses the curing by Christian Science treatment of cases of diseases given up by physicians, but objection to the offer was sustained, Cole, however, was allowed to testify that he had successfully treated a dog whose owner then became a Christian Scientist. There will probably be a second trial.
