STAYS ON HIS FARM THIRTY-ONE YEARS

MARSHFIELD, Mo., April 26—That "there is no place like home" has become more than a theory with Lafayette Jason, a farmer who lives near here. Jason has demonstrated that home is the most attractive place on earth by staying there morning, noon and night for thirty-one years. In all that time Jason has not set his foot off the quarter section which he farms and, he says, he never expects to.

Jason is not a hermit nor a miser. He is in excellent health, physically and mentally. Neither does he aspire to fame as one of eccentric habits.

"But," says he, "I believe more is to be gained by staying at home and attending to my own business than by gadding about."

"So saying, Mr. Jason waves his hand in the direction of his well cultivated fields, his farm machinery in excellent condition and other evidences of successful methods. His happy family consists of a wife, two sons and a daughter who do not share the husband and father's views to the extent of practising his stay at home theories, and Mr. Jason is willing. He has his own reasons for staying at home and he thinks they are good ones.

"It was the year of the Marshallfield cyclone that I reached the decision," Mr. Jason says. "It was along about that time that I was sowing a particularly large crop of wild oats and the day of the tornado I was in Marshallfield. With three friends we were what might be called 'painting the town.' The storm came without warning. We saw the people running and were just added enough to believe that they were trying to get out of the way."

"The next day I was found with a fractured skull; my three friends and nearly a hundred of other persons were killed outright. I was for three weeks in a critical condition. I was engaged to be married at the time and as I lay ill I made a vow that I would marry, if the girl I had chosen was agreeable, and that I would not leave my farm, which my father gave me, from the day of my marriage until the day of my death. Nor do I expect to."

Mr. Jason's house is a quarter of a mile off the public road. His farm is eight miles from Marshallfield, four miles from Ninanaua, a railway station, and a mile and a half from Forkner's Hill, a country store. Ninanaua and Forkner's Hill he has never seen, as they have been established since his term of self-exile began. He has no idea of the growth of Marshallfield or Springfield, thirty miles away, except as he reads of their development in the newspapers. He never cares, he says, to go to town or see other parts of the country. He used to long to break his exile and only by the promise to himself for many years after he made it. It goes without saying that Mr. Jason has drunk no liquor in thirty-one years.

All of the business of the farm in the neighboring towns is transacted by his wife or sons.

OBITUARY.

On Monday morning, April 3rd, death came suddenly and peacefully to Neil McSwain, Sr., at the home of his son-in-law, Edmund Munroe, Creek River, Lot 63. The deceased was in the 72nd year of his age. He had been in failing health from heart trouble for the last two or three years. Mr. McSwain was born in the Highlands of Scotland, from whence his parents emigrated to P. E. Island in the year 1840, and settled in King's County, in the vicinity of Highbank. In early life the deceased was a hardworking, industrious man. He was among the early settlers of Creek River, where he made for himself a home and farm, cutting down the forest and clearing the land, converting the heavy wood into timber for ships and wharves, and hauling the same to shipyards and to Murray River. He was also fond of taking contracts for roads and bridges. The deceased was a man of strong convictions, an intelligent citizen, a member of the Presbyterian Church of Murray River, and a lover of the good old modes and forms of worship so dear to his fathers. About forty-one years ago he was united in marriage to Miss Annie McLean of Alliston, who survives him. He leaves also four daughters and five sons to cherish a father's memory. The daughters are: Mrs. Edward Mann and Mrs. John A. McDonald of Alliston; Mrs. Nestor Black of Alliston. His sons are: John Angus, Peter's Road; Neil, Westville, Pictou; Artemas, Pictou Island; Malcolm and Chester, on the homestead. The funeral took place from his late home and was largely attended, and his mortal remains were laid to rest in Little Sands Cemetery. Services at the house were conducted by Rev. A. Gray. FOR UP-TO-DATE FARMERS.

This is the time of the year when people should be looking after their cattle. The roots are generally finished or are beginning to rot. The cattle are getting tired of the dry hay or dryer straw, and little care now will help wonderfully the flow of milk in summer. Now is the time too to pick up some new blood. It is not likely that there will be an importation of Ayrshires this Spring, but some excellent stock is being offered; Summerside on Wednesday, May 3rd, both cattle and horses and those wanting to improve their herds should make it a point to attend. It is not however sufficient to buy good stock, they must be well fed and cared for to give satisfactory results. It is to be hoped this will be a banner year for Live Stock.

The Lime Sulphur solution for spraying while the buds are still dormant is made as follows: Into boiling water put 20 lbs of fresh unslacked lime and while this lime is still slacking put over it 18 lbs of finely pulverized sulphur. Boil hard for one hour, adding sufficient water to keep mixture from burning. After it has boiled for one hour add sufficient water to make 40 gallons and apply to the trees while still warm. Every particle of the trees should be covered with the spray.

Where the proper varieties have not been purchased is setting out an orchard it is an easy matter to change over by grafting. This operation can be done any time up till the middle of May. They scions however, should be cut at once and stored in the cellar. It is an operation that requires very little skill. Anyone can do it after having once seen it done or by paying strict attention to the information contained in the pamphlets that are being distributed from the Dept. of Agriculture. It is useless however, to set out trees and to graft them unless they are properly sprayed and now is the time to do this spraying.

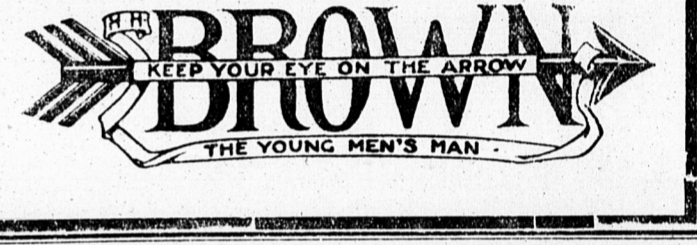

DEGENERACY.

Dr. A. F. Tredgold, medical expert of the Royal Commission on the Feeble-Minded, lecturing a week ago on "Eugenic and Future Human Progress," took a pessimistic view of this country's future. A long argument dealing with the falling birth-rate and the statistics of crime, insanity, and pauperism leads up to the conclusion that the stream of degeneracy, mental and physical, is steadily increasing, and threatening to become a torrent. He contends that our present conditions, including many of our social reforms and most of our charitable organizations, favor the increase of the unfit. He urges the cultivation of a healthy public opinion as the chief means of encouraging the multiplication of the fit, and insists that there is urgent need for immediate restrictive legislation with respect to the feeble-minded and to cases of proved hereditary transmissible degeneracy. The audience were unanimously prepared to support this policy, quite oblivious apparently of the difficulties of formulating a practicable scheme.

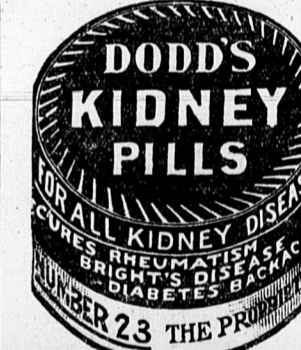
