HOW THE RED SKIN PROSPERS IN THE WEST

Rev. John Semmens of the Indian department, returned on Saturday from a six hundred mile trip of inspection extending over three weeks, which was memorable rather than enjoyable to him. His marching orders, unfortunately, came a little too late in the season; or, to put it another way, the spring opening came a little too early for the journey. The snow was already gone from the land when the start was made, and the party had to travel largely on the ice, hence the journey was longer and more difficult and desolate than it would have been by the regular winter roads. Very fair progress was made, however, as far as Fisher River.

The business done at that place was more directly with the new reserve, Peguis, which is near the Fisher River reserve, being separated from the western boundary of the latter by a tract three miles wide left for homesteading. The Peguis Indian settlement began last summer, and 35 families from St. Peter's are now comfortably housed there, largely with the aid of the Indian department. The people have erected new houses under the supervision of John Sinclair, a resident of the reserve, who is regularly employed by the department as foreman there. The Indians have been supplied by the department, with lumber, shingles, doors, windows, nails, tar paper, locks, hinges, etc., and they have done the work themselves. The government has made provision for 23 additional houses, and it is expected that that number of families will be added to the colony this year.

The Peguis reserve has been so named in honor of the first chief of the St. Peter's band known to the government and to history. It was Mr. Semmens' duty to take an inventory of everything on the reserve, in doing which he had to call on every house and see if the conditions laid down had been complied with, and whether the people were satisfied with the amounts of lumber, etc., given them. Until recent changes came into effect this territory was in charge of Sydney Swinford as inspector.

Mr. Semmens found that the Indians had spent the winter very comfortably. The department had made every provision for their wants. The soil, he says, is good. He has never seen a reserve better adapted to the raising of stock and there is a tremendous acreage of the best hay lands in the country. He found 100 bushels of potatoes on hand ready to start the people in agriculture, and they had plows, harrows and other necessary implements ready on the ground. There was also a store of goods for the sick and destitute, sufficient to prevent any possibility of starvation. Arrangements have been made for them through the wise provision of Agent Swinford.

Mr. Semmens next went up the lake to Jack Head river and Berens river, inspecting the schools as he went along. He found the roads very heavy, there being much water on the ice, so that he could not reach the usual stopping places, but had to camp out of doors a great deal, and occasionally to take his meals on the ice. On two nights it rained until midnight and then snowed until daylight—but these things, he says, were only trivial incidents in the usual winter's travel.

Coming down the east side of Lake Winnipeg Mr. Semmens found a great deal of difficulty owing to the fact that at the points and between the islands, the ice had become very weak through the operations of currents underneath wearing of the ice from below. From this cause the party found themselves a number of times in great danger. They had to pass through acres of water on either side, taking the ice between. At times they were unfortunate enough to have their dogs fall into the water, though luckily there were no fatal or serious results. They visited Hole river, Black river and Fort Alexander on the east shore, but could not go to Brokenhead owing to the fact that no ice was found in the river and there was no ice at hand. They consequently turned to Gimli and took the train home from there, putting the dogs and sleigh on board the train. They had three teams of dogs and a leader, making seven in all, in charge of their owner, Capt. Anderson, of Selkirk, an experienced navigator on Lake Winnipeg for thirty years past and long known as the captain of his schooner, The Hustler, which was wrecked last summer.

Speaking generally of the Indians whom he saw, Mr. Semmens states that they are well off. He found it necessary only at Jack Head River to give a little help, and even that necessity might have been avoided if the parties had been as provident as they should have been. As a rule everybody has had plenty this winter. He found a good deal of sickness at Jack Head River and Berens River, from a species of la grippe. The social and moral condition of the people he found far from being as encouraging as he could have wished. He considers it absolutely necessary that something be done to enforce the law over the Lake Winnipeg area. He has been trying to secure the appointment of a stipendiary magistrate to exercise jurisdiction over the whole of the lake. The occasional visits of an Indian agent cannot meet the wants that arise from disregard of law. Some instances that came under his own observation showed a deplorable and disgraceful state of affairs. The number of missionaries and teachers is quite inadequate to restrain evils of this kind. There is no missionary or teacher at Peguis, the missionary at Jack Head is being withdrawn, and there is none at Hole River.

Navigation, Mr. Semmens believes, will be open this year by the 1st or 15th of May instead of at the usual time, a month later. On Saturday at Selkirk there were eight or ten craft brought around from the slough and lying along the wharf, being prepared for the season's work. The construction of a number of fishing boats for Capt. Robinson by Archie White was in progress, and he was also building a boat for the department. Capt. Parry was building a large gasoline and sailboat for Mr. Rogers, trader at Fisher River.

EXPERIMENTS IN CREAMERY INDUSTRY.

The Dairy Commissioner, J. A. Ruddick, has completed arrangements for carrying on an extensive series of experiments during the present season, having for its object the improvement of the creamery industry in Canada. The work will be in charge of Geo. H. Barr, Chief of the Dairy Division, who will be assisted by J. G. Bouchard, creamery expert, and other members of the dairy staff. There could be no better assurance that the work will be carried out carefully and intelligently.

Speaking of the proposed experiments, Mr. Ruddick intimated that they would be conducted at a creamery and at the farms of some of its patrons, somewhat on the lines of the experiments in milk which were conducted by Mr. Barr during the past two seasons, the results of which have already effected so marked change and improvement in the methods of handling milk for this purpose.

Mr. Ruddick is a strong believer in the value of practical demonstration or illustration in matters of this kind and he points to the success which has followed the Department's demonstrations in the cooling curd of cheese and to the work already referred to in connection with the handling of milk.

The creamery industry in many parts of Canada, is now conducted on what is known as "The Cream Gathering System." It is recognized that the methods at present followed in operating creameries on this system are defective at certain points and these defects make it difficult to secure the highest results in quality. Many leading dairymen have opposed the adoption of this system on these grounds, but as the farmers are determined to stick to it and it is their right to do so, if their every effort should be made to put the system on the best possible working basis.

"We do not propose" said the Commissioner "to encourage the substitution of the cream gathering system for the whole milk system, but we shall endeavour to improve existing conditions."

The exports of butter have fallen off during recent years, but there is no decrease in the quantity manufactured and it is just as important as ever that the quality should be of the highest class and that the creameries should be conducted on economical lines, not only in regard to cost of operation, but so as to ensure the highest possible return from the raw material supplied.
