THE Guardian representative has visited Bridgetown and succeeded in getting the following further particulars relative to the bold robbery reported on Saturday. It appears that John Ward, who owns the building, is away, and the Post Office is kept by Mrs. Ward, who discharges her duties in a way satisfactory to all and is a careful and painstaking official. She used to take the money received for P. O. Orders to her bed room, but the late Mr. Brecken told her if she kept it looked in a trunk in an inner room it would be safe enough. This she did until it amounted to one hundred when she would send it to the bank. The amount on hand Monday night was about ninety dollars. Mrs. Ward went to bed about 11 p. m. and between that and morning the robbery took place. That evening a Farmers' Institute Meeting was held at the hall which did not close until 11 o'clock and it would probably be 12 before those present had departed for their homes. The night was very bright and fine. The robbers to gain entrance cut out a back window next to the orchard, out of sight of anyone passing down the street, and worked their way by opening a door into the room where the money was kept by using a false key. By means of a screw driver they opened the trunk, and in order to prevent anyone entering were considerate enough to lock the door leading to the hallway, through which Mrs. Ward would have to come in order to get into the room. Besides the money, the P. O. Order Book was also taken and what use they expected to make of it no one can judge. It is rumored that certain strangers were in that vicinity on Monday, ostensibly for the purpose of buying cattle, and whose lodging place on Monday night is not known. They have not been heard of since. Suspicion also rests on another party, and a "bailiff from Montague is in the vicinity for the purpose of making an arrest. Interesting developments are hourly expected and the people are anxiously awaiting results.

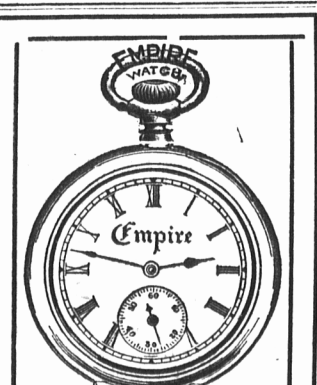


**The American Girl.**
