**CAR BUILDING INDUSTRY.**

Sir.—It would seem that the opportunity for the establishment of several industrial plants in Charlottetown is now with us. I've read your interesting editorial in today's "Guardian" (17th) on the several propositions or enterprises in view. It appears to the writer that the one of outstanding importance at the moment is that of "Car Building." The others can wait for future consideration, but owing to the fact that we have as it were the start already under way of the car building enterprise, nothing of an ordinary nature in the way of difficulties should deter us from pushing the matter to a final conclusion, and one that will be to our industrial advantage.

The stumbling block, it would appear to the "car building" industry is that of "cost," and if we can satisfactorily adjust this we are assured the proposition can be carried out.

To adjust the "cost" question and any others that may arise, it is assumed that expert in this particular line of business, would be necessary. No doubt we have these right here men who can get right to the bottom and furnish facts and figures of undoubted reliability—nothing else will do—at this stage of the matter.

The writer knows nothing of car building, but looking at the opportunity of starting this industry from a citizen's point of view and one intensely interested in the matter I respectfully suggest the following:—

That those delegates who have interested themselves in the matter should enlist the services and advice of men in this city thoroughly at home in what is required from start to finish, in the building of a railway car, either freight or passenger. Without doubt, the proposition is a large one and there are many difficulties to overcome before a final and complete report can be submitted to the Government at Ottawa.

Now Sir, I don't wish to take up too much of your space, but let me in conclusion express the hope that whatever is done in the matter of car-building and the utilization of the Government's car-building plant here—that all political tendencies to favoritism will be eliminated. Let us all be in accord—sincerely and faithfully to get this splendid industry started. Its possibilities are simply immense. Nothing so fine has ever presented itself in an industrial sense to the people of this island and surely all of us will reasonably view the undertaking in a non-political aspect. In this way only can the advantage be taken of the opportunity—such a one as has never before come our way—of getting started an industrial establishment, the possibilities of which are simply unlimited.

THE OLD 6TH C. M. R.—A letter from Major R. A. March, St. John, who has many friends in Charlottetown from the Canadian Cavalry Training Brigade headquarters at Shorncliffe, enclosed a group photo of the sergeants and officers of the old 6th C. M. R. who were left after the third battle of Ypres. Of this group, Captain Pines and Sergeants McGeary and Holmes have since been killed, and Captain "Bun" Beckwith, Lieutenant Barnes and Sergeant L-wether have been wounded. Lieutenant Barnes has been a major, and Sergeants Lewis and Eaton have received their commissions. Major Barnes and Sergeant Martin have been decorated with the Military Cross, and Sergeant Major Gill has received the D. C. M. The only officer of the 6th C. M. R. remaining in France is Major B. W. Roscoe, D. S. O., who was wounded and in hospital at the time this picture was taken. Major March wrote that he was awaiting orders and expected soon to be with the survivors of the group.

The programme included the anthem by the choir, "Suff of My Lord," a very fine setting by Ashford, a duet by Mrs. Freeman and Mrs. Quigley, quartette by Mrs. Henderson, Miss Boyver, Dr. Yeo and Mr. W. Duffy and a decidedly well-rendered contralto solo by Mrs. S. Henderson. Prof. Tatton the new organist made a splendid impression, his work being very artistic throughout. The Pastor, Rev. Mr. Freeman preached a powerful sermon, his subject being "The Ministry of Music," his text being taken from Psalm 96, "O Sing Unto the Lord a New Song," etc. He said that among all nations music has held an honored place. All through sacred history it has been the medium for hearts overflowing to God and in every great movement of the church it has furnished inspiration. Music that enriches a service and has the worshipful spirit is not operative. It is the kind of music which appeals to the heart and creates a worshipful atmosphere.

I suppose they are missing Angus very much. He didn't come over in this bunch. Alexander McLean is over here and is well. We were in Glasgow, Scotland, on pass before we came over here for seven days and had a good time. If I was home now I would have some stories to tell you. I know the home people are lonesome and it makes me feel lonesome when I think of them but if God spares me I'll soon be home with them. 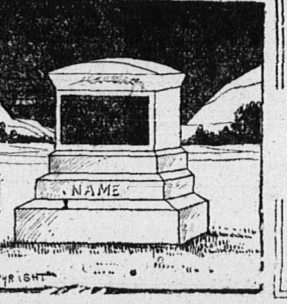
