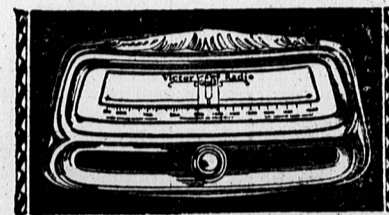
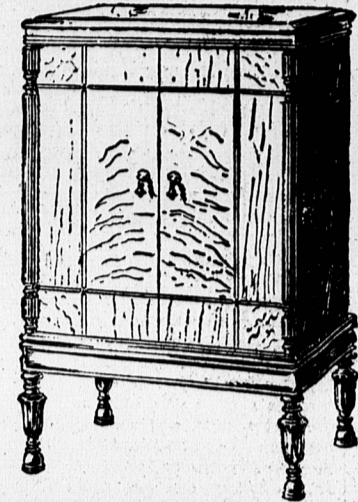

Cattle Club Champion Win At Toronto

TORONTO, Ont., Nov. 21.—French Canada came to the front in remarkable style at the Toronto Royal Winter Fair today when two young French Canadian farm lads from Waterville, Que., were adjudged Canadian champions in boys and girls cattle club work. The boys are Emile Pettit, and Irene Bouillard, they having proved themselves supreme against all comers in the annual Canadian elimination contests held at the Royal Winter Fair, under the auspices of the Agricultural Department of the Canadian National Railways in co-operation with the various federal and provincial authorities. The boys become possessors of the W. J. Black trophy, presented by Dr. Black of the C. N. R. Coincidental with this announcement came the selection of three eastern Canada farm youths, one from Ontario, one from Nova Scotia and one from New Brunswick to comprise the All Canada Cattle Club team to go to Great Britain next year to compete in the annual International Cattle Judging Contest, under the auspices of the National Association of young farmers' clubs. The fortunate three for overseas

are Clifford Baldwin, of Barrie, Ont., a bright youth of English immigrant parents, Cedric Kirkpatrick, of Wirral, New Brunswick, and Gordon Campbell, of Stewiacke East, Nova Scotia. They were the three highest aggregate scores in the C. N. R. Cattle Club contests, and will go overseas next July under the auspices of the Federal Department of Agriculture and the C. N. R. This is the first time Canada has been accorded this honor. The two French Canadian youths who won the new Canadian championship in cattle club work won the Quebec Provincial Championship at Sherbrooke last August. They were coached by Stephane Boly, federal livestock promoter, in the Eastern Townships, and Emile Lemere, district Agronomist. They had a total marking of 875 against the next highest team, that from Barrie, Ont., with a total of 872. Clifford Baldwin and Stewart Bell were the Barrie team. Harry Patterson and Cedric Kirkpatrick, of Wirral, N. B., were third, Marjorie Harper and May Prowse, from Prince Edward Island were fourth, and Henry Stewart and Gordon Campbell of Stewiacke, N. S., fifth. Clifford Baldwin, who is to represent Ontario on the International Judging team, was born in Barrie, Ont., of parents who put a short time before, had come from Peterboro, England, to take up farming here. He is 17 years of age. Gordon

Campbell, the member from Nova Scotia, is a little lad, scarcely into his teens, who has done clever work in the judging team at Stewiacke. The New Brunswick boy is a particularly good type of club member, and has a fine record behind him in his club work at Wirral, N. B. All three should give an excellent account of themselves in Britain next summer, when they will compete against teams from Britain and the U. S. A. at the Royal Agricultural show.
