TUESDAY Since our article of yesterday on the income tax appeared we have learned that some persons were used a year or so ago for non-payment of this tax, a fact of which we had not before heard or read. We hasten to make the correction. All lawful taxes ought to be paid, and if not paid voluntarily should be collected by legal process. We have yet to learn that all the delinquents were sued, of not, why not? Favoritism or exceptional treatment in collecting is as bad as favoritism in assessing for this tax. In fact, the one accentuates the other. The cases we have heard of where legal measures were resorted to were those of persons with small incomes. Just why they were singled out for examples and other and far richer delinquents excepted we have yet to learn. Publicity must be had in this matter. Where there is secrecy there is danger.

We are now informed that the salaries of the judges do not pay as large a share of the total income tax as we had supposed. Be that as it may, it is in the interest of the revenue and of those who pay taxes that the tax shall be made to bear equally upon all who are liable and that all who are liable shall be made to pay.

It has been noted that at the recent conference in Ottawa between representatives of the federal and provincial Governments as to their jurisdiction regarding the incorporation of companies they failed to agree. The Supreme Court of Canada will now be called to decide the matter and the decision when it is given will be of important interest.

Over in Brussels the hat pin has come into court. A man was standing on the platform of a street car when it stopped suddenly. A lady was thrown against him and her hat pin pierced one of his eyes, destroying the sight. The court awarded him \$2,000, one half to be paid by the owner of the hat pin, and the other half by the street car company.

Montreal and its suburbs are now said to have a population of 592,000. That is more than the population of Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island taken together. A million and a half of Canada's people now live in the ten leading cities.

The New York Peace Society has sent out an instructive illustrated circular setting forth the alarming cost of the armies and navies of the world. The object of the society is to strengthen the forces leading toward international good will, and to substitute law for war. It is proposed to effect this by working for a wider appreciation of the principle of arbitration, promoting mediation, encouraging a reduction of armaments, denying the right of conquest, holding up true ideals of national honor and fostering sentiments of mutual sympathy and respect among the nations. Truly this is a noble work.

It is estimated that fifty per cent. of the wheat crop in the prairie Provinces had been sown on April 8.

The Canadian mint is to issue in the near future a five dollar gold piece and a silver dollar after the manner of the American cartwheel.

The Prince of Wales will this year open the Parliament of United South Africa. This is the third of the great over-sea dominions to be united federally, Canada having been the first and Australia the second. And South Africa is prospering too, and fast recovering from the Boer war's impact. It can never be a white man's country in the sense that Australia and Canada are. The native black population is too numerous and increasing too rapidly for that. Britain and Boer have need to unite and stay united to deal with the native problem, and they realize this quite presently.

The Educational Review, a high-class serial devoted to advanced methods of education and general culture, discusses the annual report of Superintendent Anderson, along lines which are somewhat familiar to readers of The Guardian. Of our system of school support the Review has this to say: "That a Government whose income is small should spend such a large amount for education in a country where the people are well-to-do, strikes one as something of an anomaly. It is a question whether the Government is not too liberal in this respect, fostering a spirit which has been adverse to the best educational interests of the Province. Just as long as the Government is too paternal, and assumes burdens which the people themselves ought to bear, just so long will education be too lightly valued. When the people are ready to make greater financial sacrifices for their schools they will take a greater pride and interest in them. Some educational changes are foreshadowed in Prince Edward Island, and probably one of them will be some shifting of the financial burden for the operation of schools from the Government to the ratepayers."

And of Dr. Anderson and his report the Review speaks in terms of deserved praise. We quote again: "It is always a pleasure to read Dr. Anderson's reports for the soundness of the educational opinion contained in them. He has guided the educational practice of the Province for nearly half a century as teacher and superintendent, and his name has been held in high repute on account of his great ability as a teacher, the enthusiasm he has been able to inspire among young people, and the many useful careers he has helped to shape."

Cremation is gradually extending as a method of disposing of the bodies of the dead in many countries. Near the city of Mexico, in Dolores Cemetery the cremating furnaces regularly reduce to ashes 250 bodies per month.

Socialism is making headway in the new world as well as in the old but in modified form in the United States and western Canada. In the city of Milwaukee the Socialist party is now in control of the civic administration and is promising great things—better schools, cheaper gas, coal, wood and bread, an eight hour day, employment for the unemployed at union rates, penny lunches, a seat for every passenger in clean street cars at three cent fares, and so on. If the new administration makes good on these pledges, Milwaukee will be heard from.

The "green goods men" are said to be operating again in Canada. Their appeal is made to the dishonest element of the community whom they would persuade to buy counterfeit bank and Government notes. It is an old game, but still it seems to pay the operators. No sympathy can be felt for the forgers who usually get a bundle of blank paper for the good money they send. They are in heart swindlers and thieves, and as the green goods operators are, and so long as one of these classes preys only on the other the public has not much to complain of. But when the bogus money is actually put in circulation, honest people also suffer.
