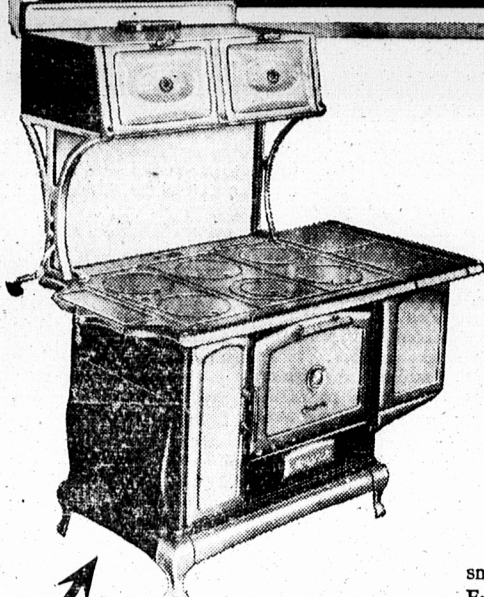

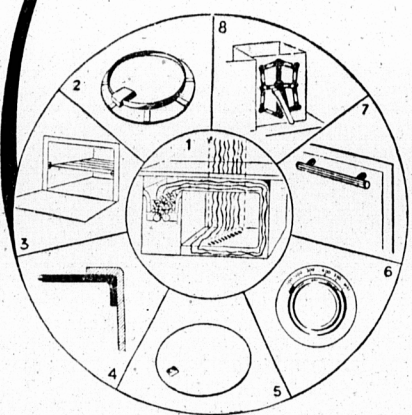

Millar Will Baby Clause Held Valid

TORONTO, Nov. 21—To the fainting of cheers from a dozen happy mothers with big families, the \$500,000 Charles Vance Millar stork derby went into official court records tonight as a legal race with no winner yet determined. Validity of the Millar will's celebrated clause 9 was upheld today by Mr. Justice W. E. Middleton in a Supreme Court of Ontario judgment.

The decision was greeted with enthusiasm by mothers who have claimed the fortune Millar offered as a prize to the Toronto mother registering the most births in the 10-year-period following his death. The deadline was Oct. 31, after which the executors sought court direction.

Mr. Justice Middleton was asked to decide, first, if the clause was valid and, second, if it was, to direct as to disposition of the estate. He will hear further argument, he stated today, before deciding which mother or mothers are entitled to the prize.

Relatives of the eccentric attorney who started action to upset his will were criticized by Mr. Justice Middleton for waiting more than 10 years "until all the harm possible had been done, instead of prosecuting their claims immediately after Mr. Millar's death."

No Longer Under Temperance Act

FREDERICTON, N. B. Nov. 21—The Canada Temperance Act is no longer in force in Westmoreland County, according to a decision handed down today by the appeal division of the New Brunswick Supreme Court. The judgment, delivered by Chief Justice Baxter and concurred in by Mr. Justice Grimmer and Mr. Justice Harrison, dismissed an appeal of Arthur Jones and sustained a conviction under the New Brunswick Liquor Control Act.

The New Brunswick case of Sheehan vs. Shaw dealing with the comparative restrictiveness of the Federal and provincial statutes and the judgment of the Supreme Court of Canada last year with reference to the Ontario counties of Perth, Huron and Peel were discussed today.

The court of appeal indicated the validity of the Canada Temperance Act depended upon continued existence of an assumed pact, namely that in Canada such an appalling state of drunkenness exists that it is a menace to the national life. No such condition exists in Canada.

Police Report Fishermen Safe

WINNIPEG, Nov. 21—(OP)—Police reports from Dauphin, 200 miles north-west of Winnipeg, said tonight all fishermen cast adrift on a floating ice field in Lake Dauphin had been brought safely to shore.

No details as to how the men had been rescued were contained in the brief communication from the Royal Canadian Mounted Police post at the Northern Manitoba town. About 50 fishermen were trapped on the huge floating ice pack when it broke off from shore early today. The field was swept out into the lake by a north-westerly gale.

WILL DO ALL POSSIBLE FOR SOUTH WALES

King Edward Concludes Tour With Message Of Hope For Unemployed.

RYHMNEY, Wales, Nov. 21—(OP) Cable)—The King closed his tour of South Wales with a message of hope.

He was in Blaenavon, once a thriving steel town, now derelict with more than half its population unemployed.

"I have followed everything I have seen in South Wales with the deepest interest," His Majesty told the chairman of the unemployment centre there. "Everything will be done that can be done."

The King's route varied today from pleasant countryside to desolate villages. He visited instruction centres and social clubs. He lunched with miners at a welfare institute. He saw boys and girls unable to find a job. Miners who had been unemployed for years broke through police cordons to pat him on the back. And ruined manhood did its best to give him a cheery welcome. On slag heaps and silent steel-works flew Union Jacks and strings of bunting.

JOINS IN SINGING

Just before boarding his train at the end of the two-day tour, the King visited Rhymney's social service centre and joined in community singing with unemployed miners. "Terrible" terrible," said the King on several occasions when he heard stories of years of unemployment told by workless miners.

Visiting 100 children eating lunch at the Artillery Welfare Centre he admonished "plea sit down and go on with your meal" when all rose to attention.

And to a little girl, busy with a bowl of soup:

"How are you enjoying it?" The child became so excited she spilled the soup and could not answer. At Pontypool another note was touched. An open letter to "His Majesty King Edward VIII" was distributed in the streets. The King learned of the letter, asked to see a copy of it and read it. The letter bore the signatures of 30 unemployed men from Eastern Valley, Monmouthshire, who joined in a march of protest against the means test from Wales to Westminster.

The letter told of a valley "blighted by the dead hands of poverty." It went on:

"We regret that your tour is planned in such a way that the terrible effects of this poverty will not be seen by Your Majesty. In these towns and villages live men continuously unemployed for from 10 to 12 years, young men denied a chance of ever getting a day's work and women prematurely old. The bodies of the children are stunted and frail. Family life is shattered by the cruel Means Test."

"We respectfully ask Your Majesty how can a suffering people believe in talk of prosperity or joyfully celebrate your coronation? We earnestly appeal to you to indicate to your ministers that the Means Test must go and that the unemployed must enjoy a higher standard of living, that work and wages shall be given to the thousands of willing hands so eagerly waiting."

Railway Hearing Opens Monday

OTTAWA, Nov. 21—(OP)—First meeting of the Board of Conciliation and Investigation on railway wages will take place at Montreal on Monday it was announced by the Labor Department today.

The board appointed by Hon. Norman Rogers, Minister of Labor consists of Mr. Justice A. K. McLean, President of the Exchequer Court of Canada, Fred Bancroft of Oakville, Ont., and W. Sanford Evans of Winnipeg. Mr. Bancroft is the nominee of the railway employees and Mr. Evans of the railway managements.

The dispute arose out of a request from the employees for removal of the present 10 per cent deduction from their basic wage rates.
