MONCTON, N.B., Aug. 21—(CP)—"Construction of a new hotel seems most desirable in the interests of the community and its future development," states the report of the hotel survey for the City of Moncton, released to the public today. Carried out by the Eidin Management Limited, of Montreal, a few weeks ago, the survey has been completed and a comprehensive report submitted to His Worship Mayor J. Edward Murphy earlier this week. It was released this morning by Deputy Mayor T. Babbitt Parlee in the absence of Mayor Murphy from the city, and H.A. Joyce, president of the Moncton Board of Trade, which joined with the City in having the survey made. The report was discussed by the Board of Trade Council and the Deputy Mayor before its release to the Transcript.

HALIFAX, Aug. 21—(CP)—R.C.M.P. tonight issued a warning to residents of fishing villages south of here to beware of floating objects resembling "oil tins," which fishermen reported yesterday had exploded near their boats. The incident was first reported to police after Kenneth Siauwhite and two companions found one of the objects at sea. They tried to haul it inboard but it slipped from their hands and sank. Fine Organ Recital Follows Benediction

Last night in St. Peter's Cathedral, a service of Benediction of the organ was held, followed by a recital on the new instrument. The offic was said by Rev. Canon E. M. Mason, assisted by Rev. W. W. Clarkson.

The music of the recital, which was throughout beautifully played by the Mrs. Walter MacNutt, organist of All Saints Cathedral, Winnipeg, was as follows:

As all who have been so fortunate as to hear Mr. MacNutt would expect, this programme was well chosen to exhibit the capabilities of the fine organ which St. Peter's is now happy to possess. This appeared more particularly in the Bach groups, in which the solid substratum of foundation tone, so essential to render at their just value the works of that incomparable master, became evident.

It is hard to choose for special mention particular numbers on a programme which was played with the full participation that one has come to expect from Mr. MacNutt. The gay and dancelike "Trumpet Tune" was well brought out, and the choice of string tone stops and softer reeds in portraying the darkness of the Lament from "Edo and Aeneas" was most artistic.

More familiar perhaps to most listeners was the lovely "Royal Water Music" of Handel. This, as many know, was written by the composer to appease his patron King George III, who had for some reason become displeased with Handel. The musicians, it is said, played it in boats on the Thames before Windsor Castle. Needless to say Handel was at once forgiven and restored to the Royal favour.

The light and spirited Scherzo of the English organist Percy Whitlock was very fine, too, as was also "Rhapsodie," a choral prelude which, noted contemporary musician, Vaughan Williams, on a Welsh hymn tune.

But it was at once apparent, when the organist began to play the music of J. S. Bach, that it was in this his heart was everything was splendidly played, with just the right registration, in all five selections. This listener was particularly familiar with the three—"Christ Lay in the Bonds of Death," "Arioso" and "Fugue in G Minor"—as he has recorded them, and can say most definitely that Mr. MacNutt did them full justice.

Particularly effective was his use of the fine 16-foot pedal open diapason in the "Arioso," which is the principal subject of the Fugue. But then in speaking of his playing of Bach, one finds it hard to avoid superlatives.

It is to be hoped that we shall soon again have the privilege of hearing Mr. MacNutt in recital here.

Brig. Agnew To Head New Military College

(By The Canadian Press) OTTAWA, Aug. 21—Brig. D. R. Agnew, C.B.E., New Brunswick area army commander, will be commandant of the Royal Military College at Kingston, Ont., when it reopens in the autumn of 1948, Hon. Colin Gibson, Acting Defence Minister, announced today.

Brig. Agnew, 50 years old and himself a graduate of R. M. C., served overseas in both world wars. An artillery specialist, he instructed at the College for several years between the two wars.

In Canada, he has been stationed at Halifax, Winnipeg, and Shilo, Man. He is a native of Toronto.

Closed to cadet training since 1942, the college in 1948 will start training of officers of the three services for the first time. Graduates will be required to serve in either the active or the reserve force.

At the end of the first year, cadets will decide what service they prefer to enter.

Steps will be taken to include a fair geographical representation from all parts of Canada, the Minister said. Certain details, including method of selecting candidates, entrance age, fees to be paid and number to be trained, still are under consideration by an Inter-Service Advisory Committee set up by the Defence Minister.

Prominent Saint John Lawyer Dies

SAINT JOHN, N.B., Aug. 21—(CP)—James B. Devoe, 57, prominent Saint John barrister died early today after an illness of a year.

He was a newspaper reporter in early years and served with the 25th Battalion as a lieutenant during the First World War. He was several times sought by the Liberal Party to be a candidate for political honors, but declined.

For some time during the Second World War he was registrar of the National Resources and Mobilization Board for New Brunswick.

Eastern Passage Fisherman Drowned

EASTERN PASSAGE, N. S., Aug. 21—(CP)—A 40-year-old fisherman of this Halifax harbor community, Percy H. Rankin, was drowned today when a small fishing craft overturned in shallow water, plunging him to the bottom.

With two companions, Joseph Rehberg and Allen White, he had disposed of a load of fish at Halifax and while crossing the harbor again ran out of gasoline.

When the boat drifted close enough to the nearby Imperial Oil wharf Rehberg and White waded ashore to get help, leaving Rankin in the boat.

When they returned they found the craft overturned with Rankin pinned on the bottom.

Police said they believed that while his companions were away the fisherman had attempted to push his craft into deeper water and away from rocks which were bumping its bottom but it had overturned, trapping him underneath.

A coroner decided no inquest was necessary.
