was twice lowered. On September 7th at Ekholm, Wis., Una Signal 2:03 1/2, won her first of three winning heats in 2:05 1/2, a quarter of a second better than the mills of Mrs. Yerks.

On September 25th at the Los Angeles Grand Fair at Pomona, California, Dottie 2:04, put on display her brilliant race, winning in 2:05 1/2, 2:05 1/2, 2:05, thereby trotting the three fastest heats ever seen on a half mile track.

The famous winter resort at St. Moritz in the Swiss Alps, where European society assembles to engage in all the winter sports from skiing to skating, will be the scene of a series of trotting events over the ice this month.

While Una Signal ranked as the fastest trotting mare in a race on a half mile track for only eighteen days, her name goes on record as the fastest five year old mare on a small oval, supplanting that of Lucille Spier which has held that distinction since 1916.

It would be pretty nice to be down in Longwood, Florida, just now. There are ten or twelve stables training at that desirable place, most of the horses being two or three year olds. No speed of consequence has been put on display as yet, but in due time the many richly bred and promising juveniles which are now showing quarters ranging from 32 seconds up will be asked to extend their efforts over a greater distance and the stars or prospective stars and possible winners of futurities will be picked by the railbirds.

Among those who take a keen interest in the training of colts at Longwood is W. N. Reynolds, one of the tobacco kings of the United States, and manufacturer of the widely known Camel cigarettes. He has several colts in Ben White's string, being regularly represented by a number of performers on the Grand Circuit, many of them stars of the first magnitude.

William McKay, Kensington, has imported from William Dickinson, Hatfield, Mass., the six year old black stallion, Bellini Scott 2:09 1/2, by Peter Scott 2:05 1/2, dam Eva Bellini by Bellini. This stallion weighs in the neighborhood of 1100 lbs., is coal black and of very beautiful conformation.

Harness racing is all the vogue in Europe and a new trotting track will be built very shortly at Budapest, Hungary, of the very latest design and with stands and equipment capable of taking care of 100,000 people.

We understand it is Mr. McKay's intention to allow his friends an opportunity of patronizing this horse and then prepare him for the races. We understand he is eligible to a 2:25 mixed class or a 2:22 straight trot. We have noticed summaries of races he has been in and he has performed most creditably.

Reports from Groveland, Georgia, tell of a sensational two year old trotter in the stable of John L. Dodge. He has already trotted a mile in 2:23 and his owner believes that he can trot in 2:18 right now and says he is the most perfect trotter he has ever trained.

John L. Dodge is a druggist who has a flair for horse racing, horse training and horse breeding and in these capacities has been very successful having bred some of the greatest horses in the world. Holly-

Billie Keyes is said to have a wonderful prospect in a three year old bay colt, Soviet, by Lee Tide 2:05, out of Janova (2) 2:19, dam of eight by Peter the Great.

In addition to 148 trotters which gained admission to the 2:10 list in 1932 there were 217 pacers, a grand total in all of 365 horses that earned their first 2:10 records last season.

Ten stallions have sired one or more of the 18 trotters. Nine of this total was contributed by two of the present great sires at Walnut Hall Farm, five by Peter Volio 2:02, and four by Guy Arworthy 2:08 1/2.

For three consecutive years Peter Volio has been represented by a three year old which earned admission to the two minute list, 1930, Hanover's Bertha (3) 1:59 1/2, 1931, Protector (3) 1:59 1/2, and Charlotte Hanover (3) 1:59 1/2, 1932 The Marchioness (3) 1:59 1/2.
