NEW YORK, July 22.—The Governing Committee of the New York Stock Exchange has adopted resolutions abolishing the Committee of unlisted securities and forbidding further dealings on such stocks on the floor of the exchange after April, 1910.

In the list just named are many of the best known speculative securities, such as Amalgamated Copper, Anaconda National, Biscuit Preferred, Tennessee Copper, Utah Copper, American Woolens and American Smelters' Preferred.

CHINA WERE SUCCESSFULLY SMUGGLED.

MONTREAL, July 22.—A party of ten Chinamen were successfully smuggled across the border into New York a few nights ago, being taken in an automobile from Montreal and by way of Plattsburg.

It is believed that an organization for the systematic smuggling of Chinamen is operating with head quarters in Montreal. United States immigration officials and detectives are investigating.

BIGAMIST SENTENCED TO 7 YEARS IN PRISON

SAN JOSE, Cal., July 21.—Christian C. Johnson, charged with bigamy by Mrs. Josephine Amelia Thretheway of Stockton, and thought to be the notorious bigamist Madison, was sentenced recently to seven years' imprisonment.

The police of San Francisco turned Christian Johnson, alias Madison, over to the San Jose authorities. All the police departments in the United States will be communicated with and every effort made to ascertain whether any other crime than that of bigamy can be laid at Madison's door.

According to the accounts so far received Madison netted in gifts or loans from matrimonially inclined women about \$6,500 in the last two years, and probably more.
