THE PAGODAS OF CHINA.

From the point of view of artistic and essentially Oriental design the pagoda possesses the most interest. These singular constructions, at least one of which nearly every city possesses, fairly dot the surface of the country. Their purpose appears to be twofold—either as monuments commemorating the virtues or the misdeeds of some departed benefactor, or as agents of "feng shui" (literally "Wind and water," the spirit genius of good and evil, which, if properly propitiated, will ward off pestilence and famine and permit only prosperity and happiness to visit the neighborhood. The very curious towers are of great antiquity. Chinese records authenticating their origin at least as far back as the early part of the Christian era. In size they vary from the little ones, which are nothing more than roadside shrines, to what was once the most beautiful and largest—celebrated porcelain pagoda of Nanking, destroyed in the Taiping rebellion. This extraordinary structure had a height of 281 feet, was built of masonry and covered with glazed tiles of many colors, and was a monument to native skill in erection as well as to artistic sense in design. Unfortunately, most of the large pagodas are being allowed to crumble to decay, although some are tended and give hope of standing for other generations to admire. The prominent ones vary in height from 100 to 200 feet, are usually octagonal in plan, with straight but tapering sides, and always are composed of an odd number of storeys.

VERY PLENTIFUL CROP OF APPLES

The Largest For Years in all Fruit Raising Countries.—Prices likely to be Kept Down.

Apples will not be a luxury this year. The crop in the Annapolis and Core walls valleys is the largest for years, and as there is also an over supply in the other great fruit raising countries of the world, Halifaxians need not fear being overcharged.

There are several reasons for supposing that apples will be cheap. During the past few weeks a Herald man was fortunate enough to meet and converse with half a dozen of the largest fruit dealers in London, which means that they handle more apples than any other men in the world. These people, the heads of reliable firms, had visited the apple growing districts of the globe and had come to Nova Scotia to see what was to be seen. They found that the crop was large, but that there was

Which, if sent to the markets of England, would hardly pay expenses. They have advised shippers to send over only number one extra apples, packed well, and delivered in good order. For any other than the best fruit they say, there is no chance. This is particularly true of only apples. The market for apples in England itself, has been so productive that the market has been crowded more than for some years past. Buyers have therefore a wide range to choose from, and they will only buy Nova Scotia apples of the best description.

Another feature which should tend to keep the price of apples down is the radical changes made by large buyers in respect to the purchase of fruit on the ground. This has been done in years gone by, but it will be a thing comparatively unknown in 1900. The best and

say they are only going to sell on consignment. This means that the farmer takes all the risk, and a hundred barrels of apples are likely to be offered in Halifax, where a dozen were a year ago. The inclination on the part of the large fruit houses to refrain from buying on their own account, is having the effect of causing apples to be held for an advance, but it is doubtful if the market will go up, if it does at all, until away late in the season. There are many disadvantages, too, in holding over soft fruit, which if allowed to remain too long lands on the other side in bad order, and it would be well for orchardists to consider some of the advice given in regard to packing. Only number one hard fruit should be the motto this year.
