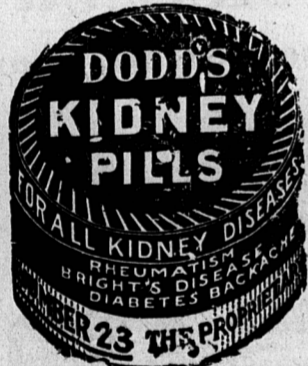
ADVANCE EXPECTED IN NEWSPRINT PAPER

NO MORE ALIEN PAPERS IN CANADA

OTTAWA, Sept. 26.—An order of council has been passed by the Government suppressing the publication of newspapers published in enemy languages in Canada. Such papers if they wish to continue must be printed in English or French. Official notification can alone be published in the Alien language. The order will affect a half dozen German publications in Winnipeg.
